Report On Groundhog

New and Comprehensive Document Being Prepared By Geological Survey

Following field work in 1948 by A. F. Buckham and B. A. Latour, a complete report, with illustrations, on the Groundhog coal field in north-central British Columbia has been prepared and will be published by the Geological Survey of Canada, according to information which has been obtained at Ottawa by E. T. Applewhite, M.P. for Skeena.

Dr. W. A. Bell, acting chief of the Geological Survey, has advised Mr. Applewhite that "the report brings under one cover essentially all obtainable, authentic, significant information on this coalfield since its recognition as such in the late years of the last century. The authors deal carefully with the location, means of access and history of the coalfield, its physical features, and with what is known of its geology. A detailed description is then given of all the known occurrences of coal, accompanied by a table listing the results of one hundred and eight coal analyses. The report includes a full bibliography of the coalfield, and includes an appendix giving a detailed description of trails leading into it. In short, the report is intended to be an adequate repository of all useful information on the Groundhog Coalfield to the end of 1948.

Field work was continued this year in the Groundhog coalfield under the direction of Dr. J. E. Muller of the Geological Survey. In spite of an exceptionally wet season, an attempt was begun to secure a more detailed idea of the structure and succession of the coal measures across the coalfield in the vicinity of the great
