HOWIE MORENZ, whose dazzling speed and scoring artistry made him the most colorful of all hockey's heroes • GEORGES VEZINA, the Chicoutimi Cucumber, rated by old-timers as the greatest of all goalkeepers . EDDIE GERARD, all-round athlete, 60-minute-man as forward and defence star of Ottawa Senators, later coach of Montreal Maroons, New York Americans and St. Louis • HOD STUART, one of the greatest defencemen of all time and the hockey idol of the masses around the turn of the century . CHUCK GARDINER, the goalie who revolutionized netminding, setting the pattern for the modern style of daring blocking in contrast to the stand-up style of the Vezina days. 
