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RATINGS ARE SIMPLIFIED

OTTAWA — Naval headquarters announced today the introduction of a simplified system of designating the ratings of all men in the Royal Canadian Navy.

The practice of referring to men by their trade or branch has been discontinued. All Chief Petty Officers First and Second Class henceforth will be addressed as "Chief Petty Officer"; Petty Officers First and Second Class as "Petty Officer," and men in the other ratings as "Leading Seaman," and "Ordinary Seaman" as appropriate, regardless of trade or branch.

For example, a man who was previously addressed as "Leading Stoker," or "Leading Air Radio Mechanic," is now "Leading Seaman." A Chief Engine Room Artificer First Class is now called "Chief Petty Officer," as is the former Master at Arms.

The new system of personnel nomenclature has been brought into effect at the same time as the R.C.N.'s new substantive structure. The latter has created two classes of Chief Petty Officer and two of Petty Officer and has broadened the opportunities for advancement in the Service.

A standardization of dress has also been implemented in the R.C.N. this year and all men below Petty Officer First Class now wear the seaman's "square rig"—bell-bottomed trousers, jumper and square collar. Affected by the change are Petty Officers Second Class and below in the supply and secretariat, medical,

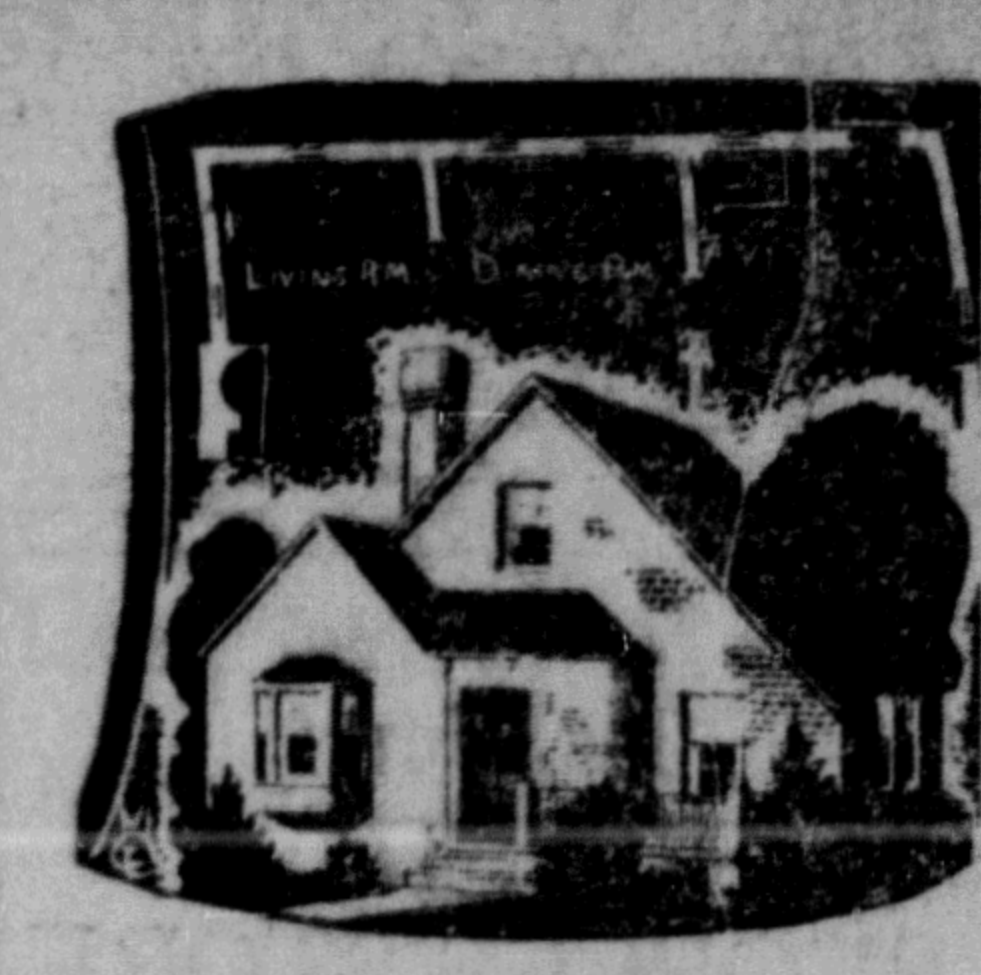
