Hector McDougall Mouatt, sixty-yearold pedestrian, the year's thirteenth victim, was instantly killed in collision with an automobile in the West End district Sunday night.

BRITON IS SLAIN BELGRADE—Tanjug News Agency said Monday that a British Army lieutenant, whose name is given as John Edmond Burke, was shot and killed by a YugoSlav frontier guard on YugoSlav territory about 120 yards from the Austrian fron tier Monday afternoon. The agency said the incident took place on a route leading from a frontier place called Ljoubelj.

YOUTHS BLOWN UP VERNON-Two youths were killed and two other boys were seriously injured in an explosion at an old army range here Sunday. The dead are Samuel Kashuba and Mike Chudyk, both eighteen. The boys had gone to the range to get soil for gardens and are believed to have picked up a two-inch mortar shell.

CONVICT-KILLERS TAKEN KINGSTON, Ont .- Two convicts who shot and killed a prison messenger Sunday in a daring escape from Kingston Penitentiary were reported captured near Syaenham, 15 miles northeast of here. They will be charged with murder. In the House of Commons at Ottawa Minister of Justice J. L. Ilsley promised a full investigation.
