## PLANE INCIDENT IS STILL MYSTERY

FRANKFURT, @—The United States Army still kept silent yesterday on the incident of a Czechoslovakian mystery plane that landed at a Bavarian airport Tuesday with 26 persons on board. Where it was coming from or where it was going or the actual identity of the passengers was not made known by the Army.

Meantime the Russian-sponsored German news agency ADN said last night that the plane had been forced down by United States aircraft after getting lost enroute from Prague to Bratislava, Czechoslovakia.

Bavarian military government sources at Munich said they understood the plane had come down of "its own free will."

Another report was that the pilot of the plane had been overpowered and forced to land by Czechoslovak passengers.

## Berlin Is Quiet Now

BERLIN @—The Berlin situation was quiet today and may remain that way for a few days while Marshal Vassily D. Sokolovsky, Russian military commander-in-chief, is out of the city. It is believed he has gone to Moscow to consult with his government. First intimation that he was away came when British officials called at his office to deliver a protest note and were told that he was out of town.

Marshal Solokovsky yesterday blamed the British with a traffic violation in Monday's British-Soviet plane collision. The Russian military commander said that, unless he was assured that British planes will observe four-power flight rules, he intends to "take measures for the protection of the safety of air traffic over the Soviet occupation zone." He turned down the idea of a four-power investigation of the crash which occurred at Berlin's outskirts and killed fifteen persons, favoring, instead, an inquiry by a Soviet-British commission.

Meantime, British authorities said today that, since they felt no assurance or protection was being given their planes over Russian-occupied territory in Berlin, they might be constrained to resort to the use of fighter escorts for transports.

### ANOTHER ROYAL ROMANCE SEEN

NEW YORK @—The New York Times said in a London dispatch that rumors of the engagement of Princess Margaret and Prince George of Denmark "became stronger today."

Prince George, 27 years of age and nephew of King Frederick IX, in recent months has been seen frequently in the company of Princess Margaret who will be eighteen on August 21.
