NO SUGAR CANDY

2 cups seedless raisins
1/2 lb. dipping chocolate
1 cup blanched almonds
Rinse raisins in hot water, drain and dry thoroughly. Melt half of chocolate over warm (not hot) water. Add raisins and almonds and blend together thoroughly. Pour onto waxed paper and pat into a thin sheet. Melt remaining chocolate over warm water and spread evenly over top of raisin-almond mixture. Allow to harden and cut into desired shapes.

Blackwood On Bridge

When Mr. Dale, the master of bridge Humanics, plays with strangers the first thing he does is try to size up the abilities of the various players. Recently he was visiting in a certain city and dropped into the local bridge club where he cut into a game with three players he had never seen before.

Mr. Dale held the North cards and his partner was introduced to him as Mr. Sharpe. East dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

North (Mr. Dale) S-9 H-Q J 7 4 2 D-7 2 C-J 8 7 6 2 West (Mr. Sharpe) S-J 10 8 H-10 D-A K Q J 10 C-8 5

The bidding: East 1S South 4D West Pass North Pass

West opened the queen of spades which held the trick. Noting the singleton spade in dummy, West switched to the ace of clubs and continued with a small club, won by East. Now East laid down the ace of hearts and, when his partner signalled with the nine, he led another heart, Mr. Sharpe ruffing with the five of diamonds.

Mr. Sharpe led a spade and trumped in dummy, returned to his hand by ruffing a heart (East discarding a small spade), and then led his last spade, ruffing with dummy's last diamond. He was now in a position to claim the rest of the tricks. Down one with 150 honors gave him a net plus score of 100 on the hand, an exceptionally fine result.

What did Mr. Dale learn from watching just this one hand? First as to the bidding—East and West were spread for six spades against any defense, but permitted Mr. Sharpe to play four diamonds and even doubled at that. Clearly they were a couple of Mr. Meeks. It also seemed clear that Mr. Sharpe had a terrific reputation among local players—they were afraid to bid against him and afraid to double him.

And what about the play? First, West had opened the queen of spades, his partner's bid suit. Today a good player usually leads the smallest card from a holding of three to the queen in his partner's suit.

Next, what was the point in West signalling with the nine of hearts holding as many as five of that suit and seeing five more in the dummy? But worst of all, why had both East and West failed to lead a trump after noting the singleton spade in dummy? That would have saved them a trick.
