B.C. POWER COMMISSION TO COME HERE

Members of the British Columbia Power Commission will visit Prince Rupert in May on invitation of city council to investigate the feasibility of taking over the city hydro development with the Northern B.C. Power Co. runs out in 1954.

The discussions will be the result of a resolution presented by Alderman H. M. Daggett and approved by council a fortnight ago which authorized the invitation of the Commission to come here for discussions.

Council received two letters last night, one from W. H. Brett, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert and one from the secretary to S. R. Weston, commission chairman, to the effect that "some members of the commission would accept the invitation."

Mr. Weston suggested May as a suitable month and left it up to Council to recommend a date for the meeting. Council turned the matter over to City Clerk H. D. Thain to arrange.



"STREAMLINED" CITY AUTHORITY

Casey Proposes More Power For City Clerk in Efficiency Interest

A resolution by Alderman George Casey which would increase the authority of City Clerk H. D. Thain in the interests of city efficiency and economy was discussed by the aldermen last night, then tabled for two weeks while the aldermen consider its ramifications.

Alderman Casey moved that "Mr. Thain be appointed cost accountant and co-ordinator to survey the entire departmental field with a view to effecting greater efficiency in both the collecting of revenue and the prosecution of work and make such recommendations as he deems advisable in the interests of efficiency and economy."

The job, Alderman Casey admitted would be "something like a city manager" but would not have the wide authority of a city manager which Alderman Casey had always opposed as dangerous to the autonomy of the council.

Nor should it, Alderman Casey suggested, carry any higher pay, at least in its experimental stages.

Alderman Casey complained that, throughout the years, there tended to be a "lack of

FIREMEN'S WAGE CONCILIATION STARTS TODAY

Hearings of a conciliation board attempting to settle wage differences between the city and the Prince Rupert local of the International Association of Fire Fighters began at the city hall this afternoon, climaxing an eight-week labor disagreement. Chairman of the conciliation board is County Court Judge W. O. Fulton while the city's representative is W. M. Watts. Thomas Elliott is the firemen's representative. The board was set up under machinery of the Provincial Labor Relations Act.

Advocate for the fire fighters is John A. Staton, of Edmonton, vice-president of the International Association of Fire Fighters, while T. W. Brown, local organizer, is advocate for the city.

The firemen's demand is for a basic monthly wage of \$260 for first class firemen who now receive \$200. The city has offered \$215. The firemen are also asking for a medical service plan to which both city and employees would contribute and also consideration of a group insurance arrangement.

In presenting the case for the firemen, Mr. Staton contended that the wages here were out of line with other places when cost of living was considered. There was also equal responsibility here, he contended.

Advising Mr. Staton are J. C. Ewart, president of the Prince Rupert local, J. S. Furness and M. Hauser.

City Clerk H. D. Thain acts in an advisory capacity to Mr. Brown.
