## CO-OP CRUMBLES BEFORE 99 TAXI

99 TAXI 19; CO-OP 12  
99 Taxi climbed back to solitary leadership in the city fast-ball league and Co-op slumped to an equally lonesome spot at the bottom of the standings as a result of Saturday night's league fixture at Gyro Park when the taximen took a 19-12 victory.

Prior to the game, 99 Taxi shared top spot in the league with C.N.R.A. with four wins and two losses while Co-op was paired with Gordon and Anderson at the bottom status with two wins and four losses.

The game abounded with the rich smack of wood on leather. 99 Taxi collected 21 hits in eight innings, nine off Alex Slater in three and one-third innings and 12 off Pallister who took over on the mound in the fourth.

Jack Rosedale, who went the nine innings for 99 Taxi, gave up 16 hits, striking out one batter, allowing five bases on balls. Slater struck out two men and Pallister four.

The Taximen took a 4-0 lead in the first inning, then built on the advantage consistently as the game progressed. By the end of the third inning, they had worked up the score to seven runs, while Co-op meanwhile had brought in three in the third.

In an effort to stem the Taximen's advantage, Co-op put Pallister on the mound in the fourth after Rosedale and Gurvich had clouted for a double each. Pallister halted the threatening break-away but was caught in the Taximen's barrage in succeeding innings.

The game brought forth some batting displays that certainly will make substantial improvements to a number of hitting records. Everett Pierce, taxi third baseman, made four hits in six times at bat, bringing in four runs, as did Jack Rosedale. Pallister, Co-op pitcher, had an equal batting record, though only two runs were scored by him.

The lodge brothers moved into the lead in the fifth when Guthrie made a hit that started off a Moose barrage which resulted in four runs, Guthrie, Kerr, Rosedale and Jones scoring. Savoys marked up a run in the fifth, but remained on the short end of the 6-5 score until the eighth.

In the eighth, Moose replaced Windle with Forbes on the mound and then the slaughter began. The hotelmen collected five runs in the eighth, then continued to press their advantage mercilessly in the ninth to score another four.

Lindsay's varied talents had full scope during the game. As well as being credited as winning pitcher, his batting record was one of complete satisfaction. In four times at the plate he knocked four hits, a triple, two doubles and a single for a pretty 1000 average.

As usual, Moose made a determined attempt to get out of their rut but, in the familiar pattern, they failed to live up to the promise shown in their better moments of play.

Savoys opened up with a three-run start in the first inning with Lindsay bringing in two of the runs off a double. Arney and Pavlikis came home from Lindsay's two-bagger and Lindsay, in turn, came home off a single by Morgan.

Moose slightly offset the Savoys lead by bringing in one run in the first when Kerr got on base on a fielder's choice and was scored by Windle.

### LINDSAY LEADS SAVOYS TO 13-5 WIN OVER CELLAR-DWELLING MOOSE

Jack Lindsay resolved a state of emergency for Savoys in a fourth-inning crisis, then retired again temporarily to his spot in centre field as the hotelmen delivered another routine drubbing to Moose in the city baseball league at Roosevelt Park Sunday. This time the score was 13 to 5.

Lindsay took the mound in the fourth, relieving Alex Bill with the bases loaded, and Hitchens, Moose catcher at bat. The versatile Savoys player made Hitchens ground to third baseman Ted Arney who then threw to second base, tagging Forbes for the third out.

In the fifth inning, Bill returned to the mound facing two men. He allowed Jones a base on balls and gave up a single to Guthrie before he was relieved for the second time by Lindsay. This time, Lindsay stayed on the rubber until the end of the game.

The Savoys victory brings to nine the number of games won so far this season, against two losses. The Moose defeat relegates them even more hopelessly to the league cellar—11 losses and only a single victory.

When Old-Country professional soccer players' contracts used to expire in May, some complained of being forced to re-sign at low wages by some clubs which, it was alleged, used as a lever the threat of a summer with no income.
