Fish Dishes—Here are several

recipes for turning sea-food into

tasty meal-time fare.

Fresh or frozen cod fillets

may be served 'au gratin,' with

tomatoes or cheese.

Cut fillets into portions and

place in greased baking-dish.

Cook in hot oven (500 degrees

Fahrenheit) 10 to 12 minutes

for fresh fillets and 15 to 22

minutes for frozen fillets.

Fillets Au Gratin—Dip fillets

in well-salted milk (one table-

spoon of salt to one cup of

milk). Roll in dried bread

crumbs. Bake in oven.

Fillets with Tomatoes—One

tin cream of tomato soup; one

tablespoon of shallots (cut in

small pieces); two teaspoons

sugar.

Salt and cover with cream of

tomato soup to which shallots

and sugar have been added.

Cook during required time.

Fillets with Cheese Sauce—

Ingredients of sauce: two table-

spoons butter; three tablespoons

flour; one cup hot milk; one

third cup grated cheese; one-

half teaspoon powdered mus-

tard and salt. Mix until cheese

is melted. Cook five minutes.

Pour over fish and place in

oven.

Fish Chowder—Ingredients:

four tablespoons butter; two

onions (finely chopped); three-

quarters cup minced celery; two

cups uncooked potatoes (diced);

in a hot oven. Serve with melted

ing-sheet. Cook 12 to 15 minutes

butter, not browned. Pour over

fish while still bubbling. Garn-

ish with parsley.
