WITH THE ISSUE so simple in this riding of W Skeena, further discussion in this column of what to do in Monday's federal election might seem to be unnecessary if not superfluous. Yet, this is the eve of polling and some comment may be deemed in order.

The electors have been regaled with argument on behalf of the respective sides in recent weeks. Now it is for them to weigh fairly and squarely all they have heard and, exercising their own good judgment, vote as they think best for the country and themselves.

The people here in Prince Rupert and Skeena should not find it difficult to make up their minds. On the one hand is a candidate supporting a government whose deeds and record they know and can assess-a government which brought Canada safely through a great war and then a critical postwar period.

There were those who predicted gloom for Canada long ere this in the postwar period. It should be easy to observe the condition in which this country is in today and say whether or not the most of people are happy and prosperous and if, by any process of reasoning, they would have been more happy and prosperous had there been another government.

Possibly, it is not unfair to suggest that no country in the world was better off from an economic standpoint than Canada both during the war and the postwar, due in large measure to the fiscal policies of the government.

But, if the people, in mature consideration and sound judgment, consider that there is good reason and it would be in the best interests of themselves and of the nation to vote against the government, they have the privilege of marking in favor of a candidate who resolutely opposed the government and stands pledged to oppose it should it be returned to office—a candidate who is pledged to a form of economy that has been amply propagated.

The voters on Monday might consider whether it is in their best interests and in the best interests of the country to spend another season in diametric opposition. There might be a good chance of one candidate, if successful, finding himself on the government side.

But the thing above all in importance is to get out the vote; to give exercise to that democratic prerogative of having a fair and free say in the government and the candidate we want. That done, all should abide content with the expression of the majority and a good job will have been done at the polls on Monday.


