Cheese Straws
1/4 cup pastry flour
1/4 cup shortening
Cold water (about 2 to 3 drops)
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup grated Canadian Cheese
2 tbsps. Bovril

Whisk flour and salt together and cut in shortening. Add enough cold water to make a stiff dough. Roll into a rectangular sheet about 1/4 inch thick, sprinkle half of the sheet of pastry with one third of the cheese. Fold over and press edges together. Roll again to 1/4 inch thickness. Repeat twice using up all the cheese. With a fork, streak the top of the pastry with the BOVRIL. Cut in strips 4 inches long and 1/4 inch wide. Place on a pan and bake in a hot oven, 450 deg. F., until crisp and brown, about 8 minutes. Makes about three dozen.

Visitors At Moose Lodge

Pioneer Members Honored With Presentations

Following the regular meeting of the Women of the Moose Wednesday night in the Moose Temple a special joint meeting of the Lodge and Chapter of the Moose was called to order by Governor Harold Hampton, who introduced a special guest in the person of District Deputy Supreme Governor A. L. Robertson of Westview.

The visiting lodge official is on tour at the present time, having just completed a visit at Ocean Falls. He is leaving on Friday's train to meet the Prince George Moose Lodge members.

Mr. Robertson comprehensively outlined the progress made by the Loyal Order of Moose and of its Chapters since Moose inception in 1906. The eighty members in attendance listened with rapt attention to the description of the homelike atmosphere fostered at Mooseheart, "The Child City," at Moosehaven, the more recently founded centre for the aged. He elaborated upon the dedication ceremony performed in August of this year of the "House of God," a structure dedicated to the freedom of worship in Mooseheart. He briefly outlined the aims and objects of the B.C. Moose Association and urged that Prince Rupert Lodge avail itself of the facilities of the organization to further its needs.

Governor Hampton then introduced Brother A. L. Robertson, Secretary of the Craig, Alaska, Moose Lodge, who spoke interestingly of his community's activities. He stated that Craig, Alaska, has a very personal interest in Mooseheart as two girls from the town are being cared for and educated in the Child City.

Brother Gillis Royer described his personal observations of the dedication ceremony gathered on his visit to "The Child City."

Official business was brought to a close with the presentation of lapel buttons to members of the local lodge for twenty-five years or more by the Deputy Governor. Members receiving his honor were: J. L. Blain, A. Peterson, F. Scadden, B. J. Bacon, J. Slagstad, O. Peterson, F. Stegavig, S. Haudenschild, Gillis Collier.

This ceremony ended hilariously with the singing of "The Gay March" by the twenty-five-year members.

During the serving of refreshments Robert Woods entertained the gathering with the music of his piano accordion. Mrs. J. R. Carr presided at the piano for community singing. Mrs. Amy Kasper and J. L. Blain rendered amusing solos.

Six Fire Calls, Two Are Serious

Of the six fire calls during October, only two proved to be bad or threatened severe damage.

The fire which gutted the home of Bernard Fortune October 17 at 1659 Herman Street, was the worst. Over \$2,000 worth of damage was caused to the building itself, while the furniture was nearly completely destroyed. Only a few pieces were saved. Other nearby homes were threatened and one actually caught fire, but was soon extinguished.

The other fire that threatened severe damage was one in a pile of oil soaked rags and coveralls in the Bytown Machine Works at Cow Bay. A fortunate spotting of the blaze by a passer-by allowed the fire department to arrive on the scene before the fire took too firm a hold.

The other calls were not of serious nature. Children playing around the rooming house of Gus Leighton at 735 Fifth Avenue east October 2 lit some paper under the house but the blaze was extinguished before any damage had been caused.

A chimney fire at Central homes in the 800 block, Second Avenue west, October 2 caused very little damage. The call to the old Canadian Legion building on Third Avenue October 23 proved to be a smolder.

New Philosophy

Changes In Education

Dr. H. P. Johns, director of educational and vocational guidance and director of Victoria Summer School and one-time King Edward school teacher here, was guest speaker at a dinner meeting of Prince Rupert District Teachers' Federation, at the Civic Centre on Wednesday evening.

Educational philosophy in British Columbia has changed greatly in the past ten or so years, declared Dr. Johns. "Our primary concern is not with the subject matter, but with the youngster."

Prince Rupert teachers were told that "there is room somewhere for an original course that will emphasize to the youngster his important three-fold role as homemaker, worker and citizen."

Such a course, entitled "Effective Living" began in September of this year in grades 7 to 13 in British Columbia. It stresses "the role of a person in a home." Previous courses have covered physical health, but now mental health and its processes will receive due attention.

Dr. Johns prophesied that the mathematics teacher will "talk in terms of budgeting and the science teacher in terms of mechanical and electrical equipment in the home."

"We are concerned with the whole child... with making him a good and effective citizen when he leaves us," Dr. Johns averred. "It is our duty to help him decide on a career... and immediate program for when he finishes High School."

Dr. Johns proceeded last night to Prince George to speak at a district teachers' convention there.

At the conclusion of the meeting Mr. R. H. Davidson, vice principal Booth School, moved a vote of thanks on behalf of the teachers.

F. R. Wright, B.C.T.F. District President, was chairman.

Celanese Veep Reaches City

George Schneider of New York, vice-president of Celanese Corporation of America, arrived in the city by plane this afternoon from Vancouver for a visit to the progress of construction of the Columbia Cellulose Co. mill at Watson Island which is now a concluding phase and which is expected to be in operation early next year. Mr. Schneider had been expected here yesterday but was delayed on account of a late plane connection from Montreal.

George Richards, treasurer of the Celanese Corporation, arrived yesterday from Vancouver as did Dr. R. H. Bell, manager of the cellulose division of the Corporation.

Others from the East interested in the local project are due today from Terrace where they have been for a couple of days after flying west.

DON'T BURN THOSE LEAVES!
WORTH LOTS FOR LEAF-MOLD

Scarcest of all garden soil improvers is humus. Few gardens have enough of it although every gardener has an opportunity to manufacture it from garden wastes, and especially dead leaves. It is estimated that the leaves from any full grown shade tree, if properly composted, will be worth five dollars to the gardener.

Never burn leaves. If piled up and allowed to decay, they produce leaf mold, one of the most useful soil conditioners which amateur gardeners can have. The more he advances in the practice of his hobby, the more useful will the gardener find this material.

So do not burn leaves. Pile them up, and invite your neighbors who are not so keen on gardening, to bring their dead leaves over to your pile. If you use no special treatment to hasten their decay, in two years or more they will be reduced to leaf mold. But you may easily shorten this period by months, if he prefers.

Select a suitable location, out of the way, and preferably screened by planting a fence 1 1/2 x 10 feet would be an average size. Clean off all vegetation, and harrow the surface soil by rolling. Pile evenly over this area all dead leaves and other waste plant and even animal material from your garden, and from kitchen wastes. But carefully exclude all wood branches,

twigs and metal objects. When the layer, well tramped down, is six inches thick, sprinkle it with a balanced fertilizer mixture, about one ounce to a square yard. Wood ashes and limestone are also beneficial, each in three or more times this quantity. Then wet it down.

Build up the heap, layer by layer, with similar applications between the layers; and keep it moist. If bad odors develop an inch of soil thrown on top of each layer will prevent them.
