Gold Drop Is Looking Good

J. O. LeFrancois of Montreal Enthusiastic About Marmot River Property

Gold Drop mining property, three miles up the Marmot River from Portland Canal, has closed down operations with the approach of winter after another season of development work which was featured by the opening up and exploration of a new ore body which has encouraged the owners to resolve on a program of diamond drilling next year which may lead to the ultimate establishment of a mill and the shipping of concentrates from a landing near the mouth of the Marmot.

J. O. LeFrancois, pioneer of mining development in the Portland Canal area and for years active on the well known Mountain Boy property, who has been directing operations this year for the Montreal interests which own the Gold Drop property, was here aboard the Camosun Tuesday, bound for Vancouver enroute to Montreal where he will spend the winter.

Mr. LeFrancois was enthusiastic in describing to the Daily News the results of this year's development work on the Gold Drop. Recent assays by John Fovland of Hyder ranged in values from a minimum of \$48.54 to \$252.72 in gold, silver, lead and zinc. One sample was up to \$112 in gold while one showed \$56.14 in silver. Lead and zinc in another was \$154.58. Fifty-seven feet of the new vein was uncovered this year and it was traced along the surface for 1500 feet. A new tunnel was driven for seventeen feet on the vein. Next year's diamond drilling will be carried on upward from a lower tunnel.

Six men were employed during the season.
