Customs Revenue Near Half Million

Customs collections for 1950 neared the 1/2 million mark at the end of the first ten months when October collections of \$48,380 brought the total for 1950 to \$497,590.69. Collections in October last year were \$15,693.74, which brought the total for that year to \$356,787.67. Total collections in 1949 were \$413,271.18, \$84,319.41 less than for ten months of 1950. Collections in September this year were \$16,750.26.

Discontinuing Of Tag Days

A letter from A. M. Hurst, principal at Booth Memorial High School, read at last night's meeting of the school board, said he would comply with the request of the board not to raise funds through tag days but added that the second paragraph of the letter containing the board's wishes on the subject asked the principals to assist the Kinsmen's Club in the sale of their shell-out tickets. He thought that inconsistent. He also asked for clarification as to what the board meant by school activities. After considerable discussion, in which Trustee Bruce Brown and Chairman Dr. R. G. Large argued against holding tag days for school activities while Trustees J. W. Scott and Mrs. E. W. Becker favored them and it was decided to instruct the secretary to write another letter to the principals asking them to consult the board before instituting any appeal to the public for funds or merchandise. A motion by Mrs. Becker instructed the secretary to add that the original letter sent out concerning tag days did not refer to the contemplated tag day in aid of the band. The motion passed with Trustee Brown dissenting.

More Food This 'Xmas

LONDON — This will be the closest to a ration-free Christmas that Britain has enjoyed since 1940, but many old food favorites will still be missing.

Butchers are already predicting that pork will be hard to get. They probably won't have enough even for regular customers, although the present meat ration is only 23 cents weekly.

Turkeys are still scarce and other shortages are sugar, butter, eggs, tea and bacon. Housewives making their own puddings and cakes will have a hard time finding raisins, mince meat and candied peel.

But the Ministry of Food has just lifted the four-pound weight restriction on confectioners' cakes. Shoppers now can order any size cake, iced and decorated, paying the controlled price of three shillings ninepence a pound.

Other welcome changes are the large quantity of Christmas puddings, by reputable manufacturers, already lining the shelves, and, for the first Christmas in years, cookies of all kinds are off ration and in quantity.

CANNED FOODS HELP
A pleasant surprise this year will be a large variety of canned prepared foods, off ration for the first Christmas since France was invaded in 1940. Most are French, Danish, Dutch, Belgian or Polish, but there also are canned corned beef, corn kernels and other delicacies from Canada and the United States.

Canned fruits generally are in ample supply but canned peaches, pears and pineapple still make only rare appearances on the shelves.

Former Nazi Likes Canada

MONTREAL — A former member of the German Luftwaffe is convinced that Canada not only is a good industrial bet but a good place to educate his 13-year-old son.

Klaus Karpf arrived in Montreal recently to begin a business trip in Canada. He is head of a precision camera works in Munich. Ten years ago his factories and services were requisitioned by the German Air Force and he not only built aerial-photography equipment but personally made test flights to make sure the equipment was in good working order.

Later his home was burned and his factories smashed by Allied airmen. A prison term followed before he was cleared by a de-Nazification court. In two years he had his factories back to pre-war production.

He said he thought it a good idea to settle German technicians in other countries "and if all goes well I may bring a few camera technicians to Canada and set up a factory here."

"I would like to send my son to Canada to go to school for a few years," he said also. "And in exchange I would take a Canadian boy of the same age and show him Europe and Germany."
