Sport Shots

The general committee of the British Women's Amateur Athletic Association is in the doghouse. It has been consigned to this over-populated hide-out by none other than the all-powerful British Amateur Athletic Board, linked by the committee's recent action in slapping a 12-month suspension on the country's two top-flight girl sprinters. Centre of the disturbance are Sylvia Cheeseman, 21, British 200-metre title-holder, and Doris Batter, specialist in the shorter distances. Both represented England at the British Empire Games in New Zealand last February.

On returning to London, the chaperone of the team, Mrs. Ruth Taylor, provoked a major sen-

sation by reporting to the governing body that the two girls "were not amenable to discipline" during their journey to New Zealand. It developed that Mrs. Taylor objected to the girls dining with some of the male swimmers aboard the ship. They also failed, she said, to heed an order calling on team members to be in bed by 10:30 at night. Before the end of the voyage she found that someone had given her an apple-pie bed.

The two girls were summoned to appear before the women's A.A.A. and told they had been excluded for a year as official representatives in international competition. "Doris and I were amazed," said Miss Cheeseman. "We were not allowed to see the report nor was it read to us. And we were given no opportunity of defending ourselves." They appealed to the highest controlling authority, the British Athletic Board. After a speedy hearing, a tribunal headed by Harold Abrahamson, winner of the 100-metre Olympic title in 1924, washed out the charges against the girls and delivered a stinging rebuke to the W.A.A.A.

"It is almost inconceivable that the general committee of the W.A.A.A. should have entirely ignored one of the most elementary principles of justice," the tribunal's report stated. "They found that these two athletes were 'not amenable to discipline' on the uncorroborated and unchallenged evidence of the team manager. It is much to be regretted that a responsible body thought fit to come to such a serious decision without attempting to obtain a clear and impartial view of the facts. . . . We think that Mrs. Taylor took her responsibilities far too seriously, and it seems to us that her ideas of what discipline was necessary were exaggerated."

The W.A.A.A. has nominated a new team manager to take charge of the British women athletes competing in Amsterdam late in August. She is Mrs. Constance Leslie, 49, who says she smokes and drinks "only a little," but does not regard herself as a strict disciplinarian. Meanwhile, Miss Cheeseman and Miss Baker have not yet been advised whether they will be on the official team.

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Aged Furnaces,
