military wing for civilian occupancy. This work was valued at \$1,000. Building permits issued at the city engineer's office for the first seven months of this year totalled \$133,375, almost exactly equal to the value for the corresponding period of 1947. Up to the end of July this year, 149 building permits had been taken out.

Value of industrial and business construction and repair exceeded \$75,000, a substantial figure which, however, was not complemented by new home construction. So far this year, only three new homes have been authorized as compared with 16 for the same period a year ago.

These three homes have a construction value of \$7,900, averaging slightly more than \$2,600 each. It is presumed that much of the work going into them is being done by the owners themselves, otherwise, at present construction prices, they could not be very commodious homes.

The continuously rising cost of construction is one of the main factors in holding up new home construction. In the five year period between 1943 and 1948, 40 new homes were built

What Ailed Canada at Olympics? Losing Basketball Worst Blow

EDMONTON (CP)—One of the more amusing and at the same time castigating comments on Canada's showing at the fourteenth Olympiad at London comes from Stan Moher (Edmonton Bulletin).

After viewing the many "failed-to-qualify" notes tacked after the names of some of Canada's leading athletes he wrote a column.

"As the war communiques used to phrase things: 'The news from the Olympic front has been mostly bad where Canadians are concerned. "Joe Blow" of Canada ran third in his heat in the 400 metres, failed to qualify. Minnie Glutz" of Canada was sixth in the breast-stroke, failed to qualify. "Speedboy Jones" of Canada was tenth in the egg-and-spoon race, failed to qualify."
"So the feverish news stories ran.

"Lack of funds, lack of adequate training facilities? Now we're getting close to the answer. An apathy to track and field on the part of Canada's fandom?"
