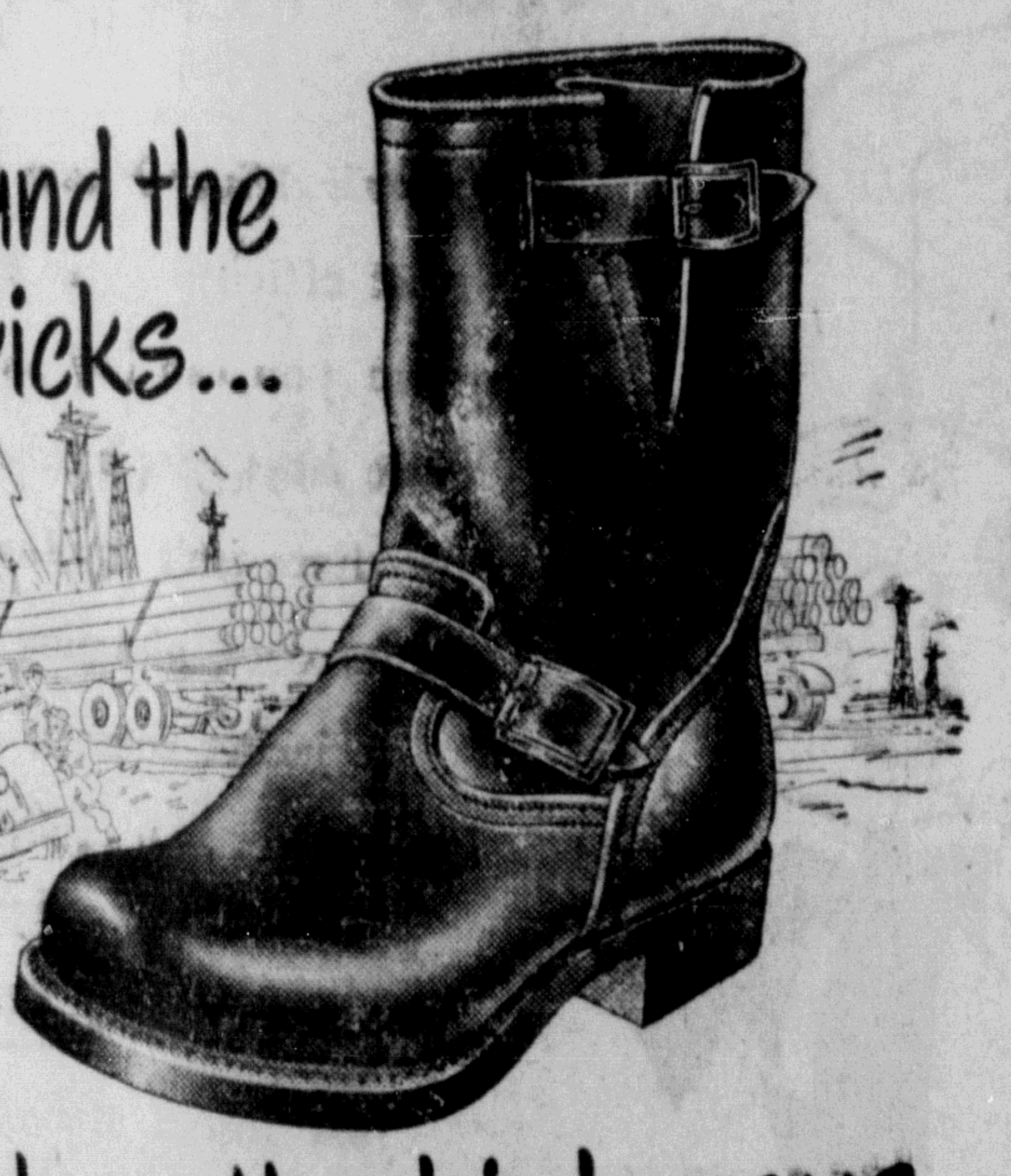

TERRACE—A Red Cross executive meeting was held in the Outpost Hospital, with President J. Stevenson in the chair. The report of the annual meeting in Vancouver, at which the secretary of the local branch, Mrs. J. Harris was the delegate, was deferred until the May meeting. The names of six workers in this branch had been submitted by Mrs. Harris to the council at the annual meeting, and these were all approved as being eligible for service badges which will be presented here at a later date. The final report of the Red Cross campaign for funds was made. Approximately \$1100 of the \$1400 quota had been collected.

Mrs. R. Thomson, Works Convener, reported that 200 articles had been made so far this year. This was a favorable comparison with last year's complete total of 200 articles in all.

Jap Skipper Tells Of Coast Attacks

VANCOUVER—Captain Meiji Tagama, a former submarine commander, speaking in Tokyo recently, described the shelling by Japanese during the summer of 1942, of certain points along the British Columbia and American coasts. The attack on Estevan Point, Vancouver Island was carried out by a sister ship of his own. This was in June. There was no serious damage.

It was Tagama's own ship that fired on Fort Stevens, Washington, in August. It was also his own submarine, carrying a plane that took part in a raid at Cape Blanco, Oregon. The plane carried incendiary bombs. Forest fires followed the raids. He said he believed the fires were caused by the bombs.
