TOBACCO IS FILM TOPIC

"Canada can turn out Virginia tobacco leaf comparable to the finest produced in the United States." E. C. Melbourne, Vancouver tobacco traveler told the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday as he presented a colorful moving picture depicting the growth and manufacture of the "weed" from the initial stage of seeding to the final packaged article. There were impressive scenes of modern methods in raising tobacco in the fertile fields of the Niagara Peninsula of Ontario and the intricate machinery employed in the manufacture of the finished product. Gyros were given an insight into the many steps leading up to the final production of a package of fine cigarettes. President Orme Stuart conveyed to Mr. Melbourne the appreciation of the club.

WAS DESPONDENT FROM SUFFERING

William Brooks, pioneer of this district who had a hand in the clearing of Prince Rupert townsite in the early days of forty years ago, came to his death by self-inflicted gunshot wounds on Sunday morning last. This was the verdict of a jury of which George Collins was foreman which sat inquest at Port Essington early this week before Coroner M. M. Stephens. Brooks suffered severe leg injuries in the townsite work here as a result of which he became permanently crippled. Two weeks ago the same leg was injured again in a logging accident and he had suffered intense pain. Rising after a sleepless night on Sunday, he went outside and shot himself in the head with a rifle. Death was instantaneous.

Born in the Nanaimo district 62 years ago, Brooks is survived by a widow and family. Interment took place at Port Essington.
