## SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. William Eccles, arrived in port here at 3:30 Wednesday afternoon, delayed by engine trouble shortly after leaving Vancouver. Her port engine was disabled near Seymour Narrows and the veteran steamer made the rest of her run on one engine.

This year the provincial government has issued licences for the operation of 39 salmon canneries, 10 pichard canneries, 30 herring canneries, 14 tiered salmon plants, 17 fish cold storage plants; 10 pichard reduction plants and 13 herring reduction plants.

The B. C. Journal of Commerce & Building Record, speaking recently of the completion of the ss. Prince George at the Yarrow Yards, Victoria, says it was one of the largest contracts performed there in a long time and that between rising costs and obtaining material, the job had its problems.

## SCHOOL PUPILS 1,112 IN MAY

Enrolment in the city's four public schools last month was 1,112, a slight drop under figures for April, according to principals' reports read at the monthly meeting of the School Board last night. Enrolment in April was 1,126.

At Booth Memorial High School, enrolment was 456, as compared with 462 in April. There were 257 in the junior school and 199 in the senior. Compared with the previous month, there was one less in the junior high and five fewer in the senior. Principal A. M. Hurst reported.

At Borden Street elementary school, enrolment was 188 and attendance percentage 94, according to the report of Principal J. S. Wilson. There was one less pupil enrolled than in April.

Conrad Street elementary had an enrolment of 203, a drop of four pupils from April. Principal T. G. Bateman reorted that the percentage of attendance was 95.

Enrolment of 265 at King Edward was down by three pupils from the April level. Percentage of attendance there, according to Principal R. G. Moore's report, was 94.

In the rural schools of the district, Port Simpson had an enrolment of 10, while at Port Essington 35 attended and 10 at Port Edward.

## Timely Recipe

**FANCY PEACH MOULD**  
A shimmering Fancy Peach Mould made into a loaf is good salad fare for a festive party or an ordinary family meal. It's made with a grapefruit gelatin base and is built with canned cling peaches and pimiento in one layer and creamy cottage cheese and lots of peppy seasonings in the other.

- 2 packages lemon-flavored gelatin
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup syrup from canned cling peaches
- 1 1/2 cups grapefruit juice
- 1 1/2 cups sliced canned cling peaches
- 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
- 1 1/2 cups cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 1/2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 1/2 teaspoons grated onion
- Salad greens

Dissolve gelatin and 1/4 teaspoon salt in heated peach syrup and grapefruit juice. Cool until slightly thickened. Arrange drained peaches and pimiento in bottom of oiled loaf pan (3 x 4 x 3 inches). Cover with half the gelatin mixture. Chill until set. Blend cottage cheese, celery, parsley, onion and 1/2 teaspoon salt into remaining gelatin; pour over peach layer. Chill until firm. Unmold onto salad greens. Slice and serve with desired dressing. Serves 8.
