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CIVIC CENTRE DEFERS DECISION ON NEW BOWLING ALLEY WING

Rather than put itself in the position of directly crossing the path of private business, Prince Rupert's Civic Centre will wait a month to learn of the expansion plans of Rex Bowling Alleys before making decision as to whether or not it will build a 10-alley operation as an addition to its present community services.

This decision was made last night by a special meeting of Civic Centre members called to consider a recommendation by the board of directors that the Civic Centre embark on an expenditure of upwards of \$65,000 to provide an additional 10 bowling alleys in the city.

The 60 members who attended the meeting raised no objection to the premise that 17 alleys are needed in the city to fill the demand for bowling but they did hesitate on the point of whether or not the Civic Centre should build in the face of a proposal by the proprietor of Rex Bowling Alleys to fill that need.

Current construction of seven

new alleys by Ed Mussellam and associates in the former Moose Hall are considered a basic requirement, replacing the six basement alleys operated by Edward Garner. Point of decision was whether or not the Civic Centre or Mr. Garner should build the additional 10 alleys which are believed necessary to fill the public need.

Civic Centre Managing Secretary Don Forward told the meeting that the community organization had received a hint last February in a letter from the Brunswick-Balke Collander Co. that that Mr. Garner planned to build new alleys. The company was at that time discussing

ing new alleys with Mr. Garner. John McLeod, who addressed the meeting as spokesman for Rex Bowling Alleys, said that the Civic Centre's plans for construction of a bowling alley had held up Rex Alleys plans for construction of new alleys but that the company would definitely build if the Civic Centre threat were removed.

"The Civic Centre has more ready capital, therefore we could do nothing in the face of your proposal," he told the directors.

Decision of the meeting to defer any building plans for a month to give Mr. Garner time to produce assurance that he plans to construct 10 alleys was made after an hour's discussion. It was adopted on motion of Joe Scott.

Major part of the discussion arose around a motion by F. E. Anfield that decision on the matter be deferred until the next annual meeting of the Civic Centre Association, which normally would occur early in 1950.

The motion was defeated, opening the way to further discussion.

An amendment, proposed by Tony Crawley, that a vote of all Civic Centre members be taken by mailed ballot was ruled out of order by Chairman Dr. R. G. Large. Members agreed that the meeting had been sufficiently advertised to be known to all and that those not interested in attending should abide by the decision of the quorum.

Mr. Forward, who is leaving for the south Thursday night, was instructed to gather more information about construction costs and revenues while in Vancouver.

There was considerable discussion on probable cost and revenues from new alleys operated by the Civic Centre, but no authoritative figures were produced.

THREE SOCCER TEAMS THIS YEAR

Plans Prepared for Annual General Football Meeting Next Week

The annual meeting will be held next Monday in the Civic Centre.

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
