U.S. Ambassador's Home In Nanking Is Invaded

WASHINGTON, D.C., (P)_ Senator Tom Connally said yesterday that a protest by the United States Department of State should be "rammed down the throats" of Chinese Communists who invaded the American ambassador's home in Nanking. He called it a "serious affront," saying "they've got to learn respect for United States rights and property."

The Department of State ordered the United States em_ bassy to lodge a vigorous protest with Communist leaders. The order was made yesterday as soon as it was reported that .091/2 armed Communist troops had forced their way into the build-.141/2 ing and routed Ambassador J. Leighton Stuart out of bed.
