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CHLORINATION HEAVY DURING WATER BREAK

Prince Rupert's domestic water supply was "super" chlorinated while repairs were being made to the break in the 18-inch main in August, according to the monthly report of the Prince Rupert and District Health Unit.

The precaution was taken against contamination and health authorities found it necessary to order closed six of the city's eleven restaurants while the water crisis was on for a 24-hour period. Close checks also were made on beer parlors and boats using city water.

During the visit of the coast travelling tuberculosis clinic to the district, 182 tuberculosis suspects or contacts were examined. The clinic visited Terrace, Hazelton and Prince Rupert.

Miss E. M. Yvonne Love, provincial nutrition consultant visited the Health Unit to do work on food services in local institutions.

Sanitarian A. Boas completed his annual trip to the dairy farms in the Smithers-Telkwa area, which supply milk for Prince Rupert. Routine inspections were made of tourist and industrial camps and city buildings.

Home visits were made by the Public Health nurses to all pre-school children registered for school and parents were urged to have their children immunized and vaccinated. Child health clinics were held, with good attendance, twice weekly at Prince Rupert and monthly at Terrace.

Announcement was made of the departure of senior Public Health Nurse Miss B. H. Smith, who left to take a post graduate course at the University of Toronto and Miss Olive Johnson, who has been transferred to the Saanich and south Vancouver Island Health Unit.

MINERS ARE BEST PAID

Weekly wages of \$48.52 placed the mining industry the highest among the nine major industrial groups across Canada. This is shown by the latest report from the Bureau of Statistics. Average weekly earnings were, across Canada: manufacturing \$40.28; logging \$37.88; mining \$48.52; communications \$37.18; transportation \$45.90; construction and maintenance \$36.86; services \$25.25; trade \$34.25; finance \$39.65. In B.C., the three top groups were logging \$50.47; pulp and paper \$50.45; and mining \$50.01. —Building Record.
