Timely Recipe

One can get that comforting feeling of satiety as easily from less known, less in demand, "thrifty" cuts, as from steaks and chops. Luckily these cuts, lower in price, are just as high in nutrition. But they must be cooked skillfully! Try this recipe:

Lamb Neck Slices
6 lamb neck slices
2 tablespoons lard
1 cup water
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

3 medium onions, sliced
3 potatoes
6 small carrots
6 large stalks celery
Brown neck slices in hot lard. Add water and seasoning. Cover and simmer for one hour. Add onions and lengthwise strips of carrots and potatoes. Continue to simmer 20 minutes. Then add celery, cut in 3-inch pieces, and simmer 15 minutes longer. Yield: six servings.

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Laden with 600 tons of ore concentrate from Polaris-Taka mine, the B.C. Steamship freighter Alaska Prince docked here briefly Monday afternoon southbound for Vancouver. After obtaining customs clearance, she headed for Port Edward to load two cars of meal at Nelson Bros. reduction plant and machinery at Celanese dock. Master of the Alaska Prince is Capt. Thos. Garlick. First mate is Phillips and J. C. MacDonald, chief engineer. The ore concentrate is bound for the American Refining and Smelting Co. Tacoma. The concentrate is barged 25 miles down the River from the mine and loaded on the Alaska Prince in the Inlet, just at the foot of famous glacier.

Union steamer Cardena, John Boden, returned to this morning from Alice Stewart and other points and sailed at 1:30 for Vancouver and wayports. After her next voyage, the Cardena will be transferred to Vancouver-Bella Coola run, replaced by the Camosun. The Rupert-Stewart route for summer.
