Two Union Steamship Co. coastal liners and a Frank Waterhouse freighter are in port this afternoon. From Vancouver via Queen Charlotte Islands, the steamer Coquitlam, Capt. Alex McLellan arrived at 11:30 this morning and will be here until 11 o'clock tomorrow night when she will sail on her return south over the same route. The steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived at 2 o'clock this afternoon from the south and will sail at 5 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Frank Waterhouse freighter Chilliwack, Capt. H. F. Stevens, arrived just before noon from Alice Arm and Stewart and will proceed south via the Skeena River cannery points where she will load canned salmon.

With a capacity list of passengers comprising largely round trip Alaska tourists, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Graham Hughes, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, sailing at noon for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here tomorrow afternoon south-bound.

**MEET JANITORS**

School Board Would Settle  
Overtime Problem

Prince Rupert School Board's personnel committee will meet with school janitors and boiler attendants in an effort to arrive at a reasonable maximum for overtime work among the schools maintenance staff.

Receipt of a bill for \$14 for overtime work by one of the school janitors set the board to examining their contract with the union and they found that, while the rate of \$1 an hour was set for overtime work, the amount of overtime which a man might claim was not defined.

The Board felt that the overtime claim, made for the month of April, was excessive, because, they said, they had been assured that overtime would be confined to heating the school during cold months.

The matter was referred to the personnel committee in the hope of arriving at a settlement with the union.

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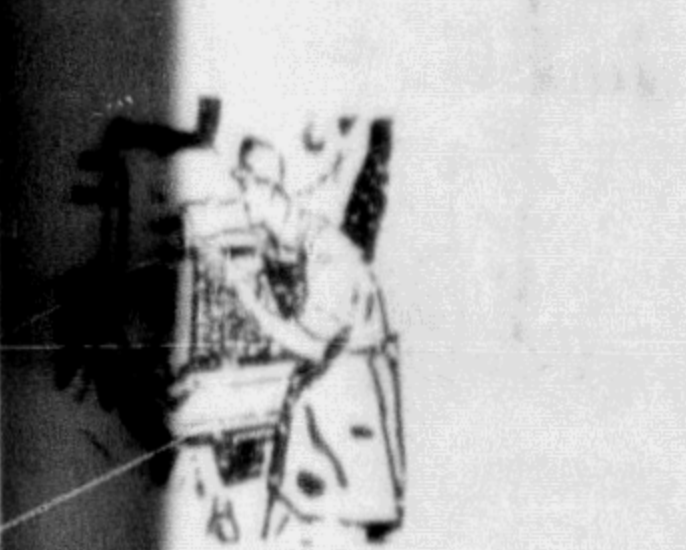
