WINNIE CAUSTIC

Churchill Unable to Under-
stand Attitude of Attlee—
Must Be Ousted

LONDON—Former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, urging the young men of the country to remain at home and fight for economic recovery, said this would have to involve the overthrow of the Attlee government. "This island," he declared, "cannot maintain its population as a great power under a socialist or collective system. The most energetic and the nimblest will emigrate and we should be left with a horde of safe officials brooding over a vast mass of worried, hungry and broken human beings."

How ministers can go about bragging of their social progress and nationalization of industry on party lines; how they can deride the system of free enterprise and capitalization which makes America great and wealthy and then, at the same time, eagerly seek the aid which has hitherto been so generously granted from across the Atlantic—that is a grimace which baffles the limitations of our language to explain. The four billion dollar loan made in 1945, it was hoped, would tide over from war to peace, was spent and largely squandered in two years.

The Experts Say...

FRESH FRUITS—Lucky is the housewife with space in the kitchen freezer to store all those fresh fruits just coming on the market.

Freezing has become one of the most popular methods of preserving food for out-of-season use.

Only high quality fruits and vegetables should be chosen—fruits should be ripe, but firm, and vegetables should be young and tender. Prepare fruits and vegetables as for canning or for table use. They should only be done in small quantities.

Blanching (pre-cooking): Fruits—only rhubarb and peaches require blanching—rhubarb to intensify color and reduce acidity; peaches to remove skins; vegetables—all vegetables require blanching before freezing in order to preserve their natural color and flavor.

Packing: fruits—may be packed in cold syrup, in dry sugar or, in the case of a few fruits, without syrup or sugar; vegetables are best packed dry, but may be packed in cold two percent brine.

Preparation of some fruits and vegetables now in season: Asparagus—select young tender stalks with tightly closed tips; remove tough purplish or white butts and scales. Wash thoroughly and cut stalks in uniform lengths. Blanch (medium stalks—three minutes; large stalks—four minutes); cool quickly, drain. Pack dry.

Spinach and chard—select tender, green leaves and remove all discolored or bruised leaves and tough stems. Wash thoroughly and blanch for two minutes. Cool quickly, avoiding matting of the leaves during cooling. Drain and pack dry.

Cherries (sour)—choose firm, ripe cherries. Wash, stem, and pit. Pack in cold medium syrup to cover. Cherries prepared this way may be used as fresh fruit. Strawberries—choose firm,

fully ripe berries. Wash, sort and hull. Pack in cold medium syrup to cover. These may be used as fresh fruit.

Moderately thin syrup: One cup of sugar to 1 1/2 cups water (makes about two cups syrup).

Medium syrup: One cup sugar to one cup water (makes about 1 1/2 cups syrup).

Add the sugar to warm water, stir to dissolve and chill. White corn syrup may be used by replacing up to one-third of the sugar with an equal quantity of corn syrup.

Amount of syrup to use: Pint containers—two-thirds to one cup. Quart containers—one to 1 1/2 cups.
