Flood Relief Campaign On

Organizing Prince Rupert to Help Relief of Continent's Greatest Disaster

Ald. George B. Casey, Ald. James N. Forman and E. D. Coughlan have been named a central committee to organize and carry out Prince Rupert's community campaign for Manitoba flood relief. Directly assisting the committee in connection with the campaign are City Clerk H. D. Thain and Miss Audrey Wrathall.

A house-to-house canvass to be arranged on the block system will be a feature of the campaign in Prince Rupert, the object being to insure that every person makes a contribution to the fund. Already, a considerable voluntary response has commenced. (The Daily News fund is over the \$200 mark).

The Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, is to have a Manitoba flood relief tag day June 3, permission having been granted by the mayor.

I. O. O. E., Canadian Legion, banks, radio station and Daily News are already actively collaborating with the campaign. The national executive of the Canadian Mayors and Municipalities has described the Manitoba flood as the greatest disaster ever to strike North America and has urged all citizens to give generously toward relief and rehabilitation.

Fishermen Buying Their Own Boats
