Borden Street School Class
Hears Mrs. L. Reade

In course of their study of "World Folks" in Grade Four at Borden Street School, the children became very interested in

the life of the peoples on the other side of the Pacific Ocean. The pupils had read many books, examined many pictures, made drawings and constructed kites such as might be flown in the eastern countries. A three-dimensional jig-saw puzzle of a pagoda was interesting. A varied collection of articles from the east maintained this interest.

The highlight came when a pupil mentioned that Mrs. L. Reade had lived in Japan and had visited China. An invitation to Mrs. Reade to come and talk to the children was graciously accepted and for over an hour she held the children spellbound as she told of the life of the peoples there. The daily life of a child, of the grown-ups; the stories of their food and their work, their art, their poverty, their endurance, all these were told in an entrancing way by one who had observed closely and sympathetically. As a result the pupils learned much of the conditions of life among these peoples and with that better knowledge will come a better understanding of their problems, their achievements and their hopes.

The children and their teacher Mrs. D. Cobb thanked Mrs. Reade very sincerely for her delightful visit.

Strike Threatens Coast Industry

VANCOUVER @—A general nine cent an hour wage increase plus maintenance of membership formula was recommended yesterday by a three man conciliation board attempting to avert a strike in the Central British Columbia lumber industry.

The award was released by the Labor Relations Board in the current negotiations between the International Woodworkers of America (I.W.A.) and representatives of 165 coast operators.

Employees total 34,000. The union asked a 17 cent boost and a union shop. A strike is threatened.

project on the grounds that it would damage the salmon fishery had never appeared before an inquiry into the matter. (Senator Thomas Reid has been consistently critical of the aluminum industry as adversely affecting the salmon fishery).

Referring to the pulp and paper industry, Mr. Kenney expressed the opinion that there was room for many more pulp mills in British Columbia which was now producing but nine or ten percent of the pulp and paper of Canada while it was cutting fifty percent of the saw timber. He disclosed that it was expected the Columbia Cellulose plant near Prince Rupert was due to go into production next April.

Speaking of the province's financial position, Mr. Kenney referred to the heavy cost of social services in the largest budget the province had ever known. The immediate future could be looked forward to with optimism but sounded a note of warning in suggesting that expenditures and taxes should be kept down to a point consistent with the population.

Mr. Kenney paid tribute to Prince Rupert's M.L.A., Jack McRae, who was highly thought of in Victoria where he pulled his weight and never hesitated to tell where Prince Rupert was and what it stood for.

The lands minister also had a good word for E. T. Applewhite, M.P. for Skeena, whom he found to be one of the most highly esteemed members at Ottawa.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Kenney for attending and addressing the meeting.

Spy Hunt Still Being Pursued

OTTAWA @—Justice Minister Garson disclosed in the Commons yesterday that a police investigation was still being made of "some" 150 persons listed in a notebook which also named Dr. Klaus Fuchs, British atomic spy now serving 14 years in prison.

Answering questions, he said investigations were still going on. Accordingly "It will be appreciated that it would not be desirable to specify the number of persons who are identified."

Garson said the notebook—actually a pocket address book—contained names of 150 persons resident in Canada at the time when the 1946 spy trails were held. It was one of many thousands of documents seized at that time.

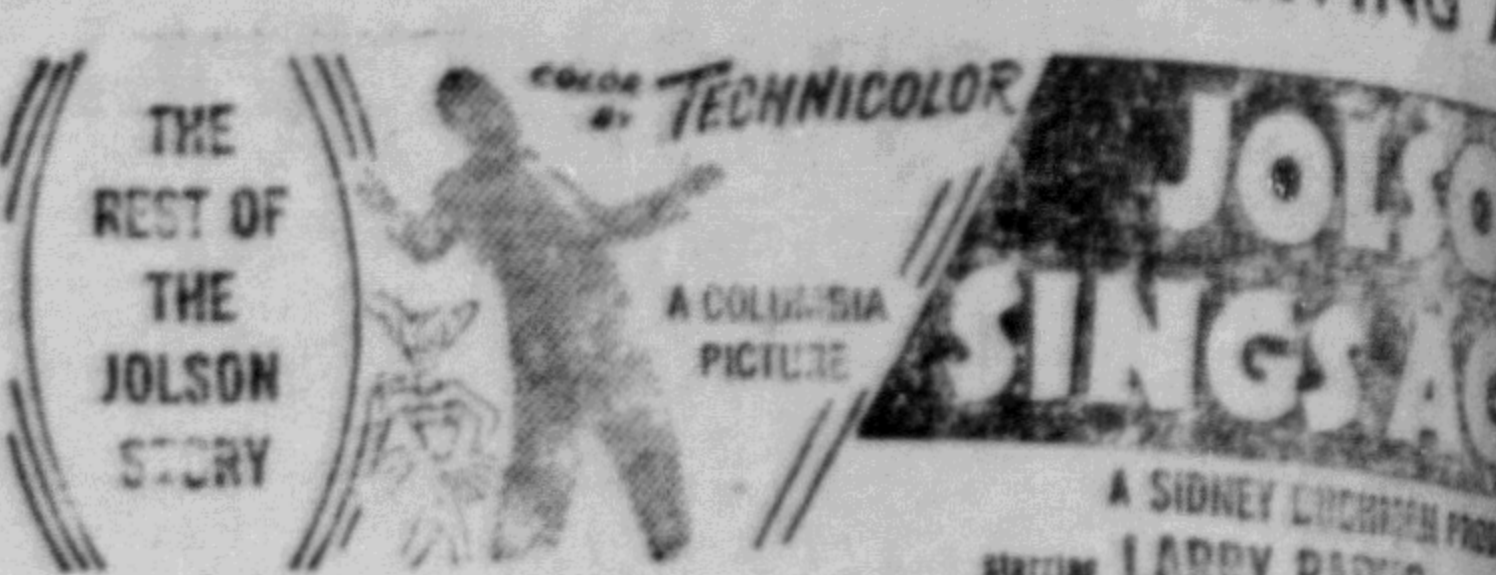

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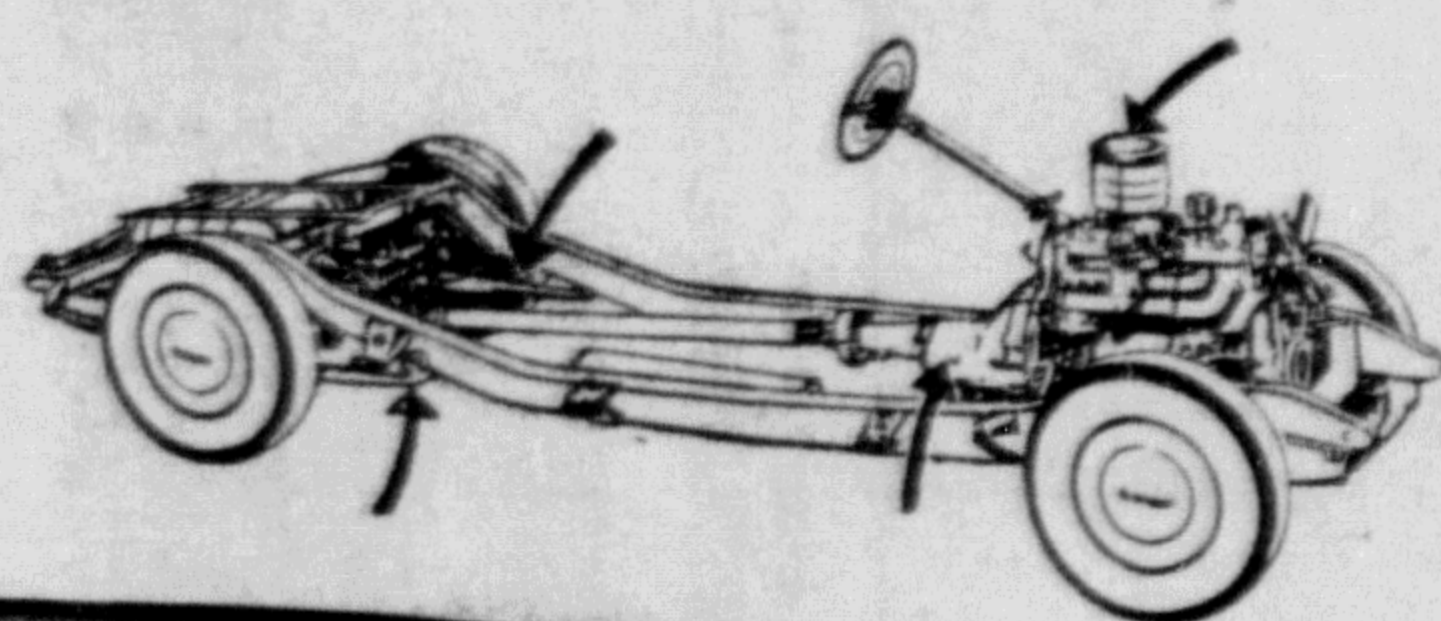
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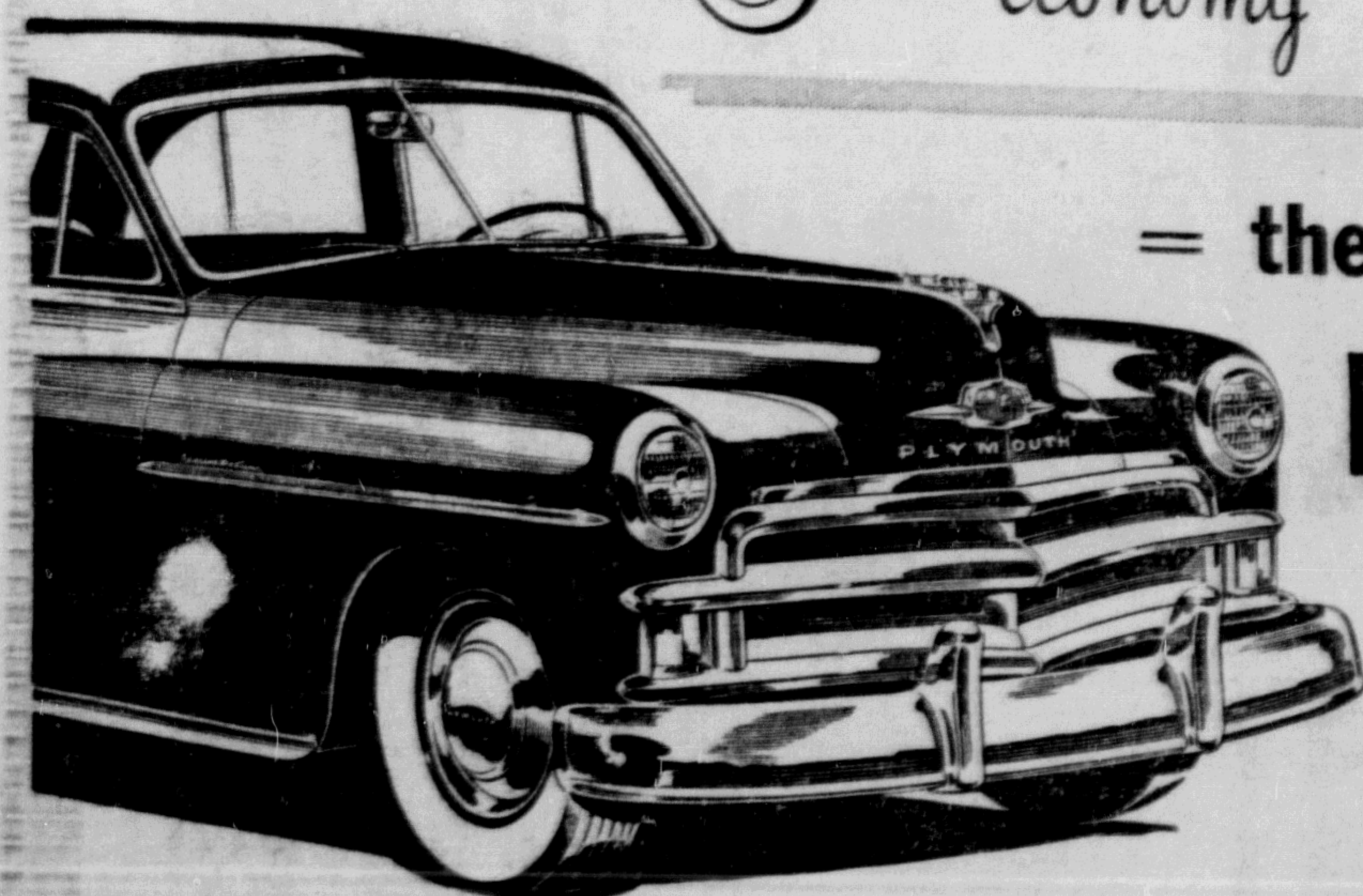
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
