Someone has made a discovery concerning the battle of the Plains of Abraham. Most of us are familiar with the painting, by a Philadelphia artist, of the death of General Wolfe. Surrounding the fallen leader, as his life ebbs away, stand about a dozen uniformed men of varying rank, each looking as if trying to think of some way to be of service. One is holding the heavy folds of a flag. A nearly nude Indian, sitting on the ground, gazes intently at Wolfe. But now, it would seem, this is all wrong. The actual record says only two (one was the dying man) were present on that September day in 1759. There was no Indian. There was no flag. Here is what happened. Certain officers wished to be seen in what was to be a future work of art, correct or otherwise, and were willing to pay for the privilege. Doubtless needing the cash, the artist had no objection. He did pretty fair at that, it's believed.
