Transportation Workers ofCanada Not Behind It, Hall Tells Attlee

MONTREAL (1) - Frank Hall, vice-president of the Railway and Steamship Clerks (American Federation of Labor), spokesman for sixteen international railway brotherhoods in Canada, announced today that a tele1 gram had been sent to Prime Minister C. R. Attlee of Great Britain, signed by himself and the heads of these brotherhoods, that "the transportation unions in Canada are not supporting the Canadian Seamen's Union" in their strike.

He believed, Hall said, that British dock workers, in their support of the Canadian Seamen's strike were acting under a misapprehension.

The C.S.U. was led by communists, Hall declared, and the Seafarers' International Union was better fitted to represent the seamen.
