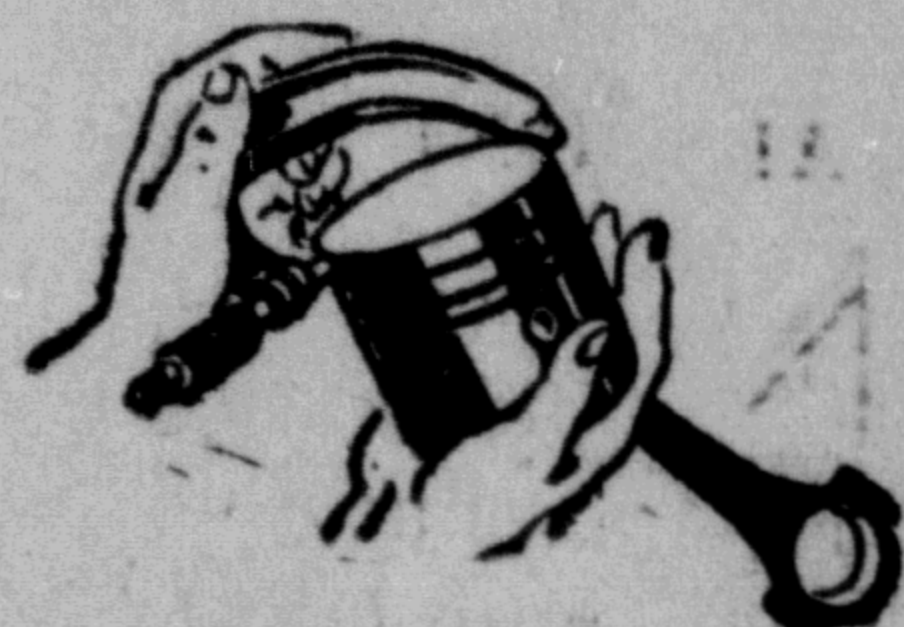

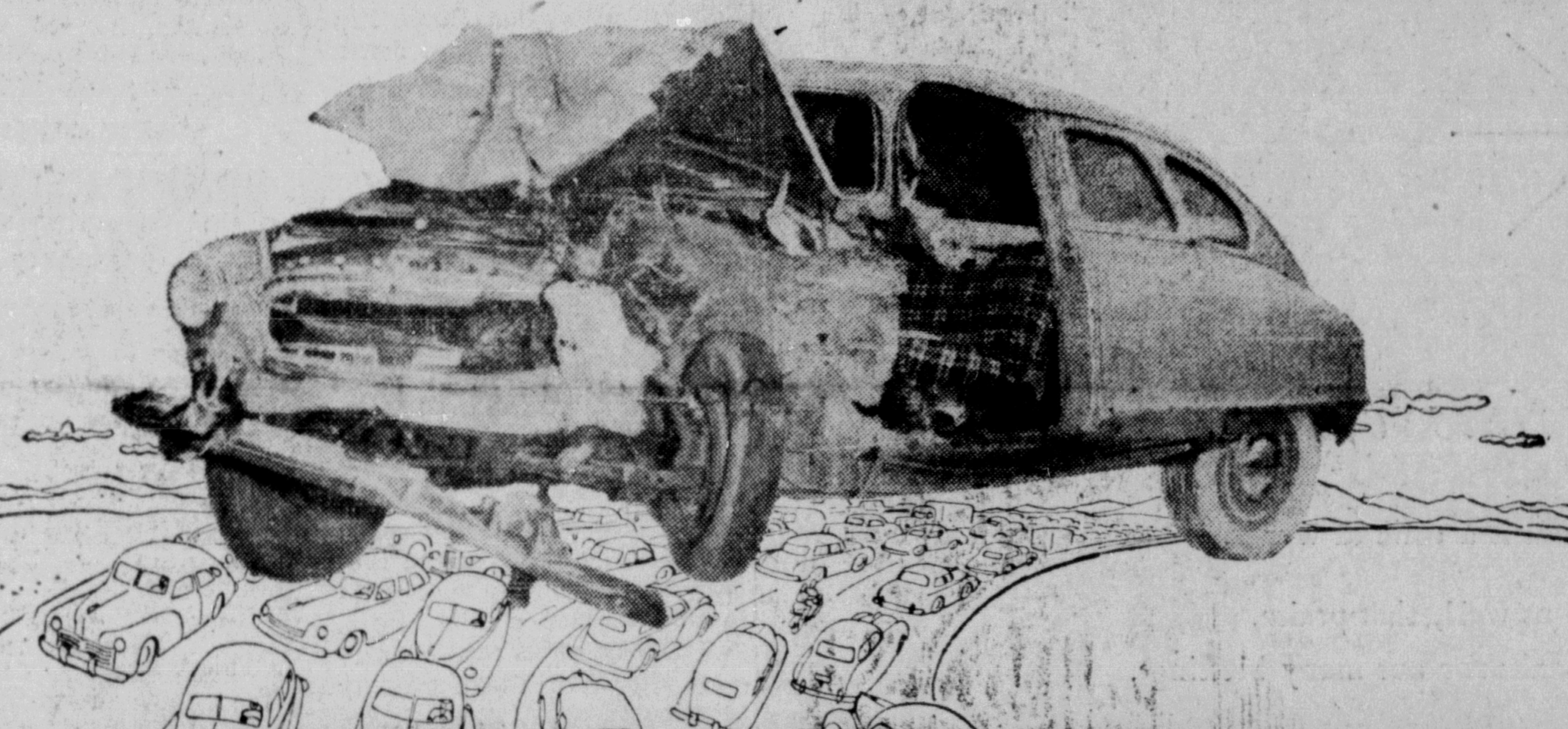

Automobile Insurance Rates Revised

EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1st, 1950 IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Government statistics showing a large increase in road traffic;
a sharp increase in the number of accidents; the well known increase
in the cost of automobile repairs; these combined with other factors
make a revision of automobile insurance rates necessary as briefly
outlined below. Rate revisions will not apply to existing policies until
their renewal.

Private Passenger Automobiles—Bodily Injury, Property Damage and Collision.

Frankly recognizing the human element in driving, a new classi-
fication is being introduced giving preferred rates on pleasure cars
where there is no driver in the household under 25 years of age.

As statistics show that young drivers constitute a serious hazard,
somewhat higher rates than those for the preferred class will apply on
pleasure cars driven by any person in the household under 25 years
of age, and more substantial premiums will be imposed on cars used
for business purposes because the loss figures indicate many more
accidents in this class.

Any increase in rates is due to the greater number of claims and
the increased cost of automobiles, parts, and labour. For instance, in
1939 a new car could be replaced for say \$1200, but today the same
make would cost \$2400. In cases of partial loss, fender, body and grill
work particularly are now more elaborate and much more costly
to repair or replace.

FIRE AND THEFT REDUCED.

Statistical records justify a reduction in the Fire and Theft rates
for both Private Passenger and Commercial vehicles and these will
be substantially reduced.

Commercial Vehicles—Bodily Injury and Property Damage.

Owing to the increased number of serious, expensive accidents
resulting in higher amounts paid in claims, an increase in rates is
necessary in most categories—EXCEPT IN GREATER VANCOUVER
WHERE THERE WILL BE A REDUCTION.

Even with the revisions that are contemplated the cost of Auto-
mobile Insurance in say Vancouver will be lower than Montreal,
Seattle and San Francisco—as the diagram shows.

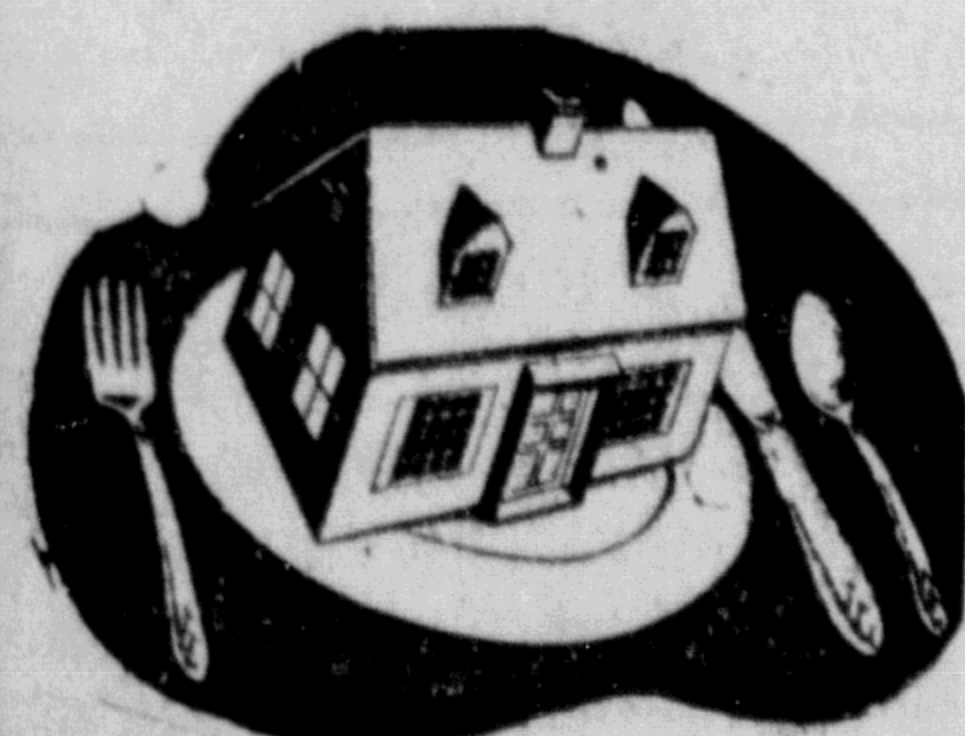
How Can Rates Be Lowered?

Rates are based on accurate statistical records of accidents. For
lower rates there must be fewer accidents. The control is in the hands
of the motorists. Continuous care, courtesy and the observance of
safe driving rules are the only ways to reduce accidents, and so
reduce rates.
