Alaska Development Board Co-Operating With E. T. Applewhaite

JUNEAU-Every effort is now being made in Ottawa to obtain a decision which would keep the Canadian section of the Haines Highway open on a year-round basis starting in 1950, the Alaska Development Board has been advised by E. T. Applewhaite, member of Parliament for the Skeena district, Prince Rupert.

Moreover, Mr. Applewhaite is strongly urging that the 117mile Canadian section be opened for traffic at the earliest possible moment next spring. That section was not opened las year until June 9, although the 43-mile Alaskan portion was cleared several weeks previously.
