Dash of salt

Baked Apples With Oatmeal
6 medium-sized apples
1/2 cup cooked rolled oats
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup water

Wash and core apples, place in pan and fill centres with cooked oatmeal to which has been added half the brown sugar. Sprinkle remaining sugar over the tops of the apples, pour water into pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., until apples are tender, about 45 minutes. Serve hot or cold with cream, top milk or custard sauce. Yield: six servings.

Fruit Blanc Manger
6 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cold milk
2 cups hot milk
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 cups frozen or canned fruit

Combine cornstarch, sugar and salt and blend with cold milk. Add slowly to hot milk in top of double boiler and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cook for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and add flavoring. Chill well. Beat with rotary beater until smooth. In the bottom of each serving dish arrange fruit (if frozen, partially thaw) then top with blanc manger. Serve with top milk or cream. Yield: six servings.

New Outfits For Autumn

Skillful Use of Reversible Linings, Change-over Capes and Buttons Provide Variety

LONDON, (C)—Quick-change ensembles of ingenious design were featured at London's fall fashion shows.

One lovely example started with a straight-skirted, stone briege polo dress with soft raglan shoulders and standup collar. The narrow three-quarter sleeves ended in stiff, stand-out cuffs which with collar and very deep belt were piped in dark mole brown.

To this could be added a self-colored apron skirt. Buttoned under the belt, it could be fastened to the back only, giving a soft gathered blouse effect.

Added to this was a Linton tweed cape of oatmeal shade with dark mole pencil lines. It is reversibly lined with stone beige. The neck and shoulder can be unbuttoned to make a straight flared skirt. This, fastened to the waist band of a matching, wide sleeved, battle-dress top makes a reversible, flare-skirted coat buttoned from shirt neck to neat waist. The diamond-shaped, buttoned shoulder line of the cape makes hip-pocket effect.

Other designs consisted of several pieces—especially the travel ensembles. These were suits with waistcoats and adjustable shoulder capes and heavy, bulky travel coats. Com-

HUDDESFIELD, Eng.—English worsteds in South Africa have to compete with a Japanese product similar in weight, quality and design, and selling from 8s. to 10s. (\$1.60 to \$2) a yard cheaper, says a report to a Huddersfield firm. The report, compiled by the firm's South African representatives, was submitted to the Huddersfield Chamber of Commerce. The chamber decided that if samples of the Japanese cloth substantiated the charge, a protest would be made to the Board of Trade.

ly near the exposed rocks which formed the shoreline.

The Discoverer came to rest wedged between two rocks with her stern hanging over deep water. There was imminent danger that she might slip into the depths.

"That is why we did not salvage any of our personal property," Sessions said. "We were afraid we would be trapped if we went below."

Sessions was a heavy loser in the wreck, because part of the Discoverer's cargo was household furniture belonging to him. He was moving from Ketchikan to Seattle.

Capt. Thornton managed to save most of his personal property.

"We certainly were glad to see the P.M.L. 15 come along," said Capt. Thornton. "We had no food and there was practically no shelter on the island. When they took us aboard they went all out to make us comfortable. We are grateful for the fine treatment they gave us."

Skipper Good saw the vessel on the rocks from a great distance and headed the P.M.L. close in to Lewis Island to investigate. It was not until they were quite close that they could identify men on the beach.

The wreck victims retrieved their half-submerged life-boat and rowed out to the police boat.

All the men were chilled and near exhaustion, but otherwise in good shape with the exception of Clare Randall, the mate, who had caught a severe cold.

The Discoverer is owned by Lawrence Erickson, Ketchikan businessman, and has been engaged in a freight service between Ketchikan and Seattle. Salvage possibilities are being investigated by Armour Salvage Co. of Prince Rupert.

Listeners Develop Skilled Musicians

Authority Says Great Audiences as Important as Great Teachers

MONTREAL—It takes good listeners as well as competent instructors to make skilled musicians, said Ria Lenssens, a pupil and former voice instructor at the Royal Conservatorium of Music in Brussels, when she came here to join the McGill Conservatorium.

Miss Lenssens, who in private life is Mme. Heyninx-Lenssens, said the creation of great singers and musicians depends on the "atmosphere" which she defined as the enthusiasm for music prevailing in some countries.

"I would stress two things as being very important for a nation to develop fame in music—excellent teachers and a favorable atmosphere for performance," she said. "This favorable atmosphere is created by a love for music on the part of citizens who are non-professionals but who are, nevertheless, keenly interested in music."

"It takes great audiences, as well as great teachers to make great concert stars."
