boots are entered as evidence.

McKnight is again acting in his own defence and Thompson is being represented by R. M. MacLeod.

The trial got under way following a selection of jurors shortly after 10 a.m. Saturday.

The following were selected as jurors:

William Bowes, (foreman) Richard Brash, Charles E. Marineau, James Laurie, John May, Liberte Basso - Bert, William Knight, George Benson, E. Manson, H. Helgeson, John McLeod and David Geary.

The case should be concluded this afternoon.

As in the first trial of the pair of accused, Const. George Redhead testified he saw McKnight wearing light colored clothes and rubber boots in the Rex Cafe Christmas Eve. In cross-examination, McKnight asked the nature of conversation he and Const. Redhead were engaged in. The police officer quoted McKnight as saying: "I have given up the life of crime."

Violet Lampare gave similar evidence to that in the first trial stating that McKnight had admitted he had broken into certain establishments and offered her \$20 to refrain from going to police. In cross examination by McKnight, she said she was serving three months on a liquor charge and was due for release that day (Saturday).

Antonio Quinerville and Clifford McDow testified again that McKnight had told them he had broken and entered certain premises and added that they would read about it in the next editions of the newspaper.

Const. A. H. Taylor testified that he and Cpl. E. A. Wales called to the scene on December 28. Cpl. Wales discovered a crow bar on the second floor near the office while Cpl. Taylor found an envelope with boot markings on it. Const. Jack White, after arriving at the store, found a ledger sheet in the office. It also had boot print designs on it.

White said he investigated the scene and was in charge of exhibits which were forwarded to Victoria for examination.

Dr. Davis, analyst with the provincial government, testified that he photographed the impressions on the envelope and ledger sheet and in his opinion they were identical with the left boot pattern of the pair of rubber boots picked up in the King George Hotel December 28. He

told court there was one chance in 100 billion of there being another boot with the same impression. He said he took measurements and in his opinion the boot and patterns on the exhibits were identical.

Following return of the court from the Gordon and Anderson establishment, crown counsel, in absence of the jury, made an application. Justice J. M. Coady ruled the evidence inadmissible.

Crown counsel T. W. Brown rested the case for the crown late Saturday afternoon and it was then that McKnight asked for an adjournment. He stated for an adjournment.

Justice Coady granted the adjournment until 10 a.m. this morning.
