VICTORIA (CP)-Morning, noon and night sessions, started this week by the British Columbia legislature mean only one thing to political observers here: they smell an election in the spring

The 48-member house, controlled by a coalition of 22 Liberals and 14 Progressive-Conservatives, has been marching through its work in jig time to date, and, observers say, prorogation may come as early as next Tuesday.

Speculation for possible election date has narrowed down to May 30, June 13 or June 27.
