Sgt. G. Mead Visits His Family Here

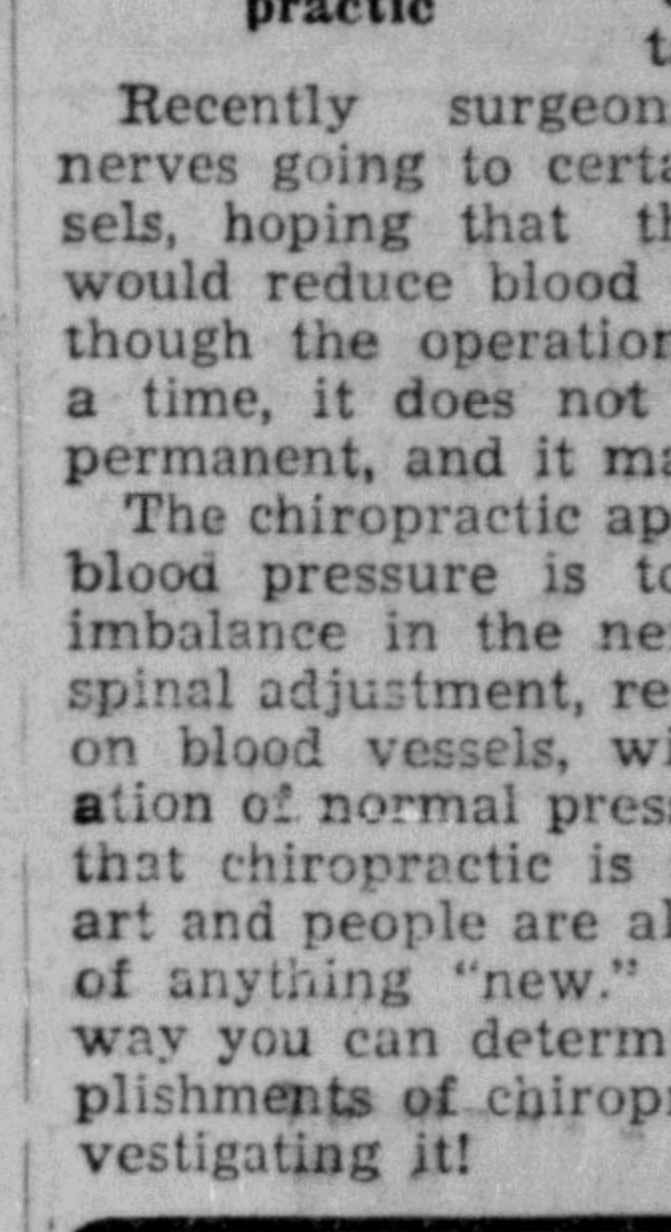

WHAT TO DO FOR HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE
