Charge Made by M. J. Coidwell, Leader of C.C.F.

TORONTO (P)--M. J. Coldwell, national C.C.F. leader, charged that a "monopoly" prevents development of daily newspapers in Canada. He told a political rally that Canada's only Labor daily plus the only co-operatively-owned paper in Canada had 'suspended publication in the last four months. He referred to the Labor-owned Glace Bay Gazette and the Winnipeg

Mr. Coldwell said that large city dailies were subjected to monopoly ownership and that the national news service, he beieved, was denied by vested inerests to other Winnipeg dailies.
