Hold the Bridge Family Tradition

CANTIC, Quebec — When it comes to holding the bridge, old Horatius should take a back seat to the McGee family in this village 45 miles south of Montreal.

As operators of the swing equipment, the McGees hold the Canadian National Railway's swing bridge across the Richelieu here. Even the railway officials call it "McGee's Bridge," though officially it's the Richelieu Bridge.

Jim McGee, now 94, took over the span in 1898. He was succeeded by his son D'Arcy, recently retired at 65. Brother Charles followed but when he retired in 13 years there will be no new McGee to take over the job. Old Jim's other two sons deserted the bridge job, one for the United States and the other for a position as foreman of the CNR's Turgot yards.

Punch down dough and roll out a scant ¼" thick; lift dough, cover with cloth and let rest 5 min. Brush with melted butter or shortening; cut into strips ½" wide. Pile 7 strips together; cut into 1½" pieces. Place cut-side up in greased muffin pans; separate slices a little at top. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in hot oven, 400°, 15-20 min.
