

Bo-Me-Hi Wins Grotto Cup

Defeats Fashion Footwear In Final Game of Intermediate Hoop Series

The Grotto Cup, symbol of the city Intermediate Basketball League championship was won by Booth Memorial High School last night when the students defeated Fashion Footwear 35-23 in the third game of the best-of-three final series which opened in the Civic Centre on Saturday.

The first game of the series was won by Bo-Me-Hi 41 to 35, while, in the second game, Fashion Footwear were victorious by a score of 29-23, giving the students their first beating of the season.

In the Ladies' League play-offs last night, Peoples Store and High School battled to a 56-56 total score tie with a game score of 28-26 in favor of Peoples Store. In the first game of the two-game total point series, Tuesday night, High School won by a 28-26 score.

After last night's game had gone into its second three-minute overtime period without change in the score, both coaches agreed to call it off and replay it on Saturday night.

The first game of the Junior League best-of-three series resulted in Stone's taking a 39-24 win from 65 Taxi. The second game will be played Saturday night.

INTERMEDIATE EVEN CLASH

The Intermediate League clash was a fairly even contest through the first three-quarters but, in the fourth period, Bo-Me-Hi put on a drive that netted 16 points and gave them a 12-point victory margin.

Outstanding marksmen for Fashion Footwear was Slatta who scored 13 points, six in the first period, one in the second, four in the third and two in the fourth. Spring of High School marked up the highest score for his team, 10 points, of which four were made on free throws.

LADIES' LEAGUE IS SEE-SAW STRUGGLE

The Ladies' League game was a struggle that see-sawed back and forth throughout the first four periods, then settled into an unchangeable balance that two periods of overtime could not alter. Fourth quarter score was 21 to 19 in favor of Peoples Store and the first overtime period resulted in both teams scoring two points.

Both teams worked feverishly in the second overtime session and each scored five points to bring the score to 28-26 for Peoples Store. Because the championship was to be determined on a total point basis, the overall score was 56 to 56 and the coaches decided on a replay Saturday night.

The game was probably the hardest-fought in the ladies' league this season and gave a real competitive boost both to players and fans.

Meeting in the first game of the best-of-three finals, for the Junior League, Stone's put on a second and third quarter drive and obtained a lead which the hard-fighting 65 Taxi squad was unable to overcome in the crucial quarter.

Sparked by Dumas and Christoff, who scored eight points each in the second and third quarters, Stone's were able to neutralize the strong opening which 65 Taxi made, thus taking command of the game.

A frenzied, fourth-quarter come-back by 65 Taxi netted them nine points, but was insufficient to pull them up from the rear, although it did reduce by four points their deficit of 10 points in the third quarter.

Christoff and Dumas scored 11 and 8 points respectively for Stone's while Bill, Ratchford and Holt each marked up 6

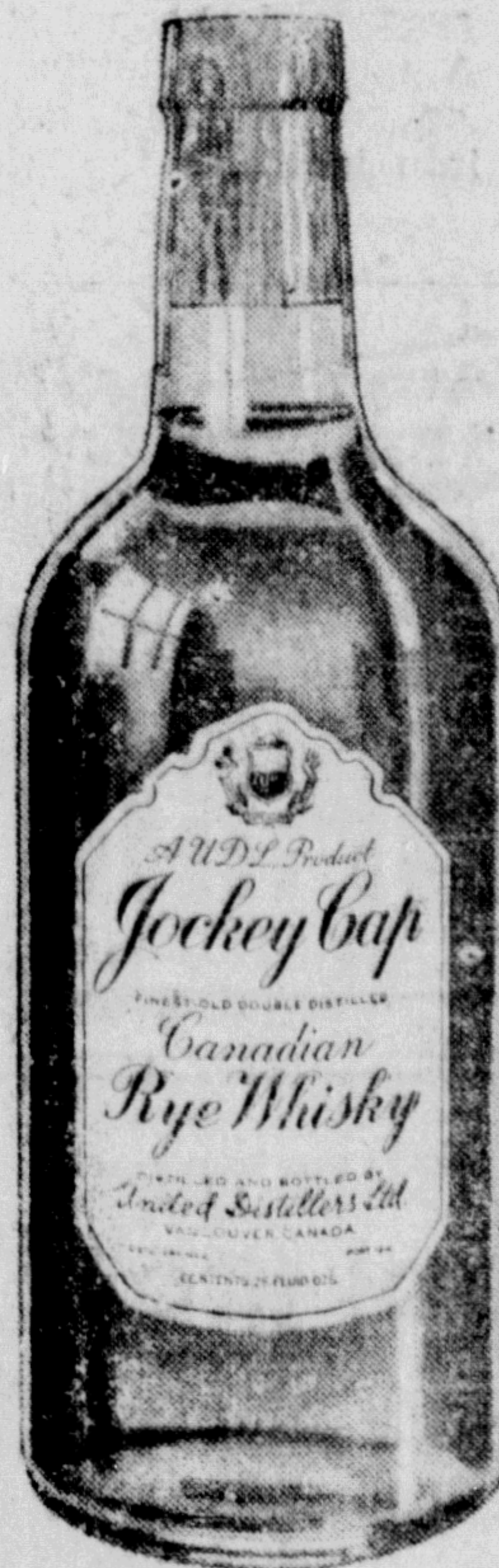
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
