BRIGHT EXHIBITION OF BASEBALL SEEN LAST NIGHT
MOOSE 6, SAVOY 3.

Benny Windle's hard-struggling Moose baseball team scored its second successive triumph over a somewhat diluted Savoy team last night by a score of 6 to 3 in a game that brought before the fans one of the brightest exhibitions of good baseball in the latter part of the season.
