LITTLE THEATRE PRESENTS BEST OF ITS SERIES

As entertaining a show, with-
in its classifications, as Prince
Rupert has had the opportunity
to witness since the wartime
days of "top talent" appear-
ances, arrived on the Civic Cen-
tre stage last night for the ap-
preciations of those hardy
enough to brave a spell of pre-
mature winter weather.

Prince Rupert's Little Theatre
has advanced to a position where
the city can expect in its spring
performances, practically noth-
ing of the amateur status which
its players now cloak themselves.

From its performance last
night in a two-act comedy and
a cleverly conceived musical,
the group is towards near pro-
fessional quality advancing
quickly.

It has demonstrated its
ability to deliver a close repro-
duction of such quality now.

"Sleepy Time Down South"
and "Hot Water" are definitely
due for repeat performances.

For atmosphere and spon-
taneity, "Sleepy Time Down
South" commended a large
measure of genuine approval,
and it was not merely because
home talent filled every quar-
ter of the stage. The show was
sometimes bad but it was gen-
erally good and it contained
something vital.

That "something" was a lusty
enjoyment of its own antics
which wiped out amateur self-
consciousness and shared with
the audience a confident feeling
of good things to come. Neither
audience nor performers regis-
tered any noticeable disappoint-
ment.

"Sleepy Time Down South"
is given prominent notice, not
because its predecessor, "Hot
Water" was less acceptable but,
because it was one of the few
examples of locally-conceived
works that has achieved produc-

to be proud.

As for "Hot Water" those who
took part in it did as good a job
as a burgeoning Little Theatre
could do on a standard comedy
theme.

"Sleepy Time Down South,"
however, placed before the
audience, the somewhat start-
ling spectacle of "Porgy and
Bess," "Showboat" and other
below the Mason and Dixon
classics which, ordinarily, have
never penetrated Prince Rupert
by any other medium than the
radio or phonograph. Elspeth
MacKenzie, Joanne Langridge,
Jacky Gustavson, Marie Lavigne
and others of the cast of 20
should do it again.

True love triumphed, as it
properly should, despite a lack
of "Hot Water" in the opener.
Its principals, who did not yield
to the involutions of its plot,
were Helen Marchildon, Kathe-
line Kerr, Harley Lewis, John
Jenkins, Mel Skalmerud and
