**Reminiscences**  
By W.J. and Reflections

Which way a city will grow is always a live topic and it's true enough of Prince Rupert. Disappointments have not been few and, as time lengthens, the impression grows that early predictions suggesting expansion would be more in the general direction of the east would appear justified. At least, it's been like that, to the present. But it must be remembered that Rupert is still small. A section has not yet been placed on the market and unlooked for and surprising developments could bring about changes influencing the trend of local events.

Back from a three months sojourn in southern California, a local citizen says he prefers the north. People are different. Of course they are. When Prince Rupert has a population of a

million and a quarter (embracing Digby Island, part of the Tsimpsian Peninsula, and the local waterfront resembles the paintings on the old Westholme Theatre curtain, the people will be all hard boiled, going like mad, and just as apt to give a woman a slap on the wrist as a seat. And not a single soul will say, "How'dy old timer. Reckon there'll be rain in the morning." He won't have time or inclination.

The Special Parliamentary Committee on High Prices has fixed the fees of two lawyers and an accountant serving it at \$125 each per day. The fees are to be supplemented by living allowances. Presumably, when these important tasks are faithfully and fully discharged, the Special Parliamentary Committee on High Fees will swing into action.
