ALMOST FROM the first 1938 issue of this signed Canadian newspaper column I have backed out-and-out federal union of the western democracies.

It was, therefore, a great encouragement to me when our Canadian Senate issued a strong call for a convention of all the North Atlantic countries to lay the foundations of transforming that loose alliance into an organic union.

IT WOULD BE silly to imagine that our Canadian Senate would pass such a resolution (with only one contrary vote) unless our government was favorable to the idea.

Now we get most convincing evidence that the British government too is moving in this direction. Two successive issues of Economic Record, issued by the United Kingdom Information Office at Ottawa, indicate this. The August 1950 issue shows that in two years Canada sold to Britain one billion dollars worth of products which were paid for by Marshall Aid.

In other words Britain was only able to buy and Canada was only able to sell because Uncle Sam was handing out huge international doles.

IN THE September number of Economic Record the U.K. Information office discusses a recent article in Lloyds Bank Review. It is by Professor Lionel Robbins of the London School of Economics.

Professor Robbins shows that the Marshall Plan has succeeded in its first objective—to stave off social and economic collapse in western Europe. But it has failed utterly in its second—namely to wipe out tariff walls and political barriers in western Europe.

He makes no bones about the main reason: "It is difficult to think of any body of responsible opinion (in Britain) which would exchange the known advantages of the central position in Commonwealth for the hypothetical benefits of political union with Europe."

Professor Robbins advocates the "integration" of the Atlantic Community as a whole. As an immediate step towards this end he would have one tariff and one money for the whole western group—that is, the U.S.A., British Commonwealth and all associated countries.

All the positive arguments favor federation of all the western democracies to pool their military forces and to integrate their economies. This can never succeed unless Uncle Sam joins—as "first among equals"—and not as the rich uncle overlord, as is now the case.

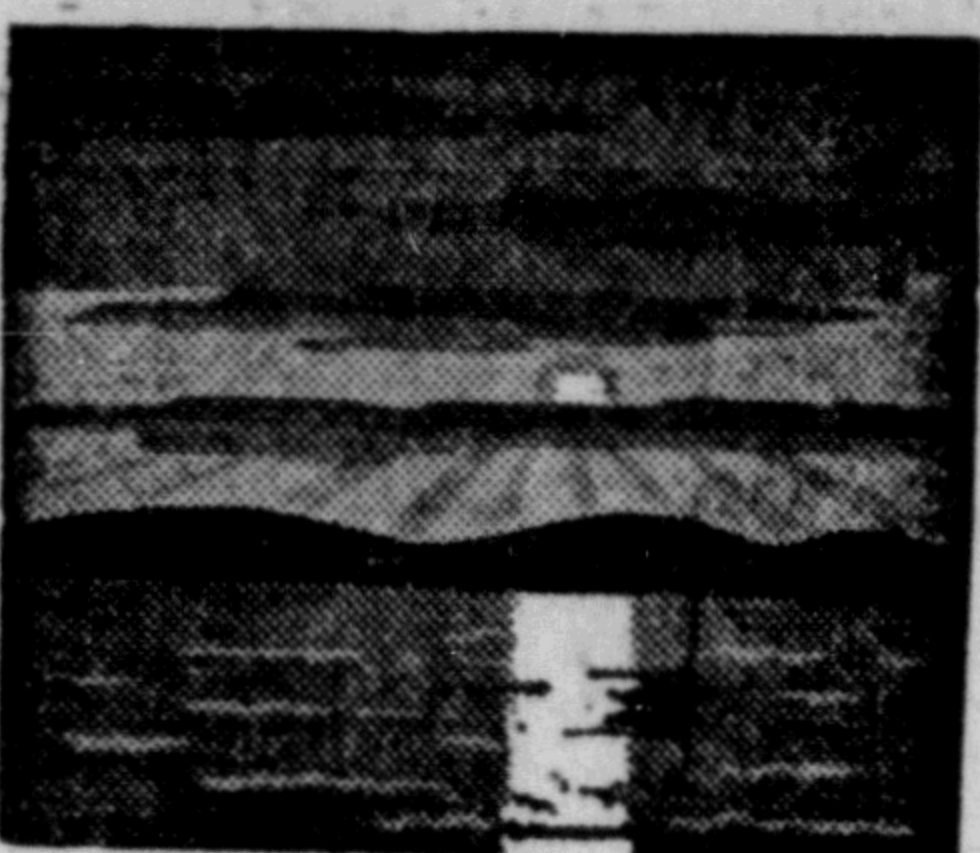
Just this week I noticed that U.S. Marshall Plan officials have notified Britain that she will have to cut her expenditures on housing and welfare services in order to carry out the huge rearmament program. As most of the money to pay for this latter comes from U.S.A. Britain must do what she is told—or else.

As things now stand we are satellites of the U.S.A. and we are kidding ourselves if we don't see it. In a federal union every Canadian, Englishman, Frenchman, and so on would have as much control over the policies of the entire federation as every American.

It's a choice of being puppet or partners.

The larger fishing boats have now all headed south, where the season is still open. But the local waterfront is quiet after the busy time since halibut fishing opened May 1.

Next week Prince Rupert will see once again the familiar Union steamship Camosun on the northern run. But instead of arriving here Friday as she did all summer, she will relieve the Coquitlam on the run to Stewart and arrive Sunday. The Coquitlam will then have its annual vacation for repairs and refitting. The Camosun has been relieved for a few weeks by the Chilcotin.

The local codder Sea Maid developed difficulties off the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands when a part of the motor broke. Captain Henry Dolron is arriving here this afternoon to replace the broken part. The boat was towed into Queen Charlotte City yesterday.

Union steamer Chilcotin, Capt. H. E. McLean, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Vancouver and way points. Disembarking here were Mrs. Docherty and Mrs. Martin. The Chilcotin sailed last night for Masset on Tuesday.

She is the former barque-rigged Fantome II, a 70-ton "dream ship" once owned by the Irish beer baron, A. E. Guinness, who died in 1949.
