BATTERY DEFEATS LEGION

Will Meet High School in Dominion Day Cup Final

In a well-contested football game last evening before an interested crowd of spectators, 120th Battery came from behind to defeat Canadian Legion 2-1 and so earn the right to play the High School eleven in the Dominion Day Cup final on Thursday afternoon.

Play was fast with Pavlikis finishing a good run with a shot that Brodie did well to stop. Following a well taken corner, Bill Murray picked up a first-class goal with a snap shot to put the Legion a goal up. Both goalies were being tested and Morgan brought off a great full-length save from Armstrong. He later cleared from Eby. A high bouncing shot from Bill Murray nearly beat Morgan who just stopped it with one hand under the crossbar. Brodie caught a header from Parkhouse and James blocked a hard drive from Bill Murray. Legion defence was not very sure. Bob Armstrong was playing nice football and Brodie did well to turn a shot from Pavlikis over the bar. He was well tested by Holkestad's centre. From a beautifully placed free kick by Darrow Gomez the Legion defence was caught flatfooted and Pavlikis steered his shot well clear of Brodie to tie the score. Pavlikis tested him again in another attack and then Ward finished very weakly.

The Battery forwards were the first to be dangerous and Brodie was lucky when he missed A. Gomez' centre but it went wide. Brodie did well to punch a corner kick away. Bill Murray missed an open goal from Christison's pass and Brodie punched Ward's shot over the bar. Both defences were being taxed severely. Bill Murray went close and then Brodie caught a fine shot from Pavlikis. Christison gave Morgan a hot hand. A good cross from Holkestad put Ward in possession in front of an open goal and the latter scored even if he was lucky in beating Bro-

die. Pavlikis and Christison had shots stopped and a tight Battery defence blocked several Legion shots in quick succession. Eby gave Morgan a hard shot and Herbie did well to punch away a perfectly taken corner by Dave Murray. Then Morgan missed a cross but Bill Murray, with an open goal, could not get the ball into the net and a grand chance was missed. Brodie also missed a centre but the ball went past harmlessly. Nelson did some good stopping and clearing but full time found the Battery leading by two goals to one and prepared to meet High School in the final on Dominion Day.

FROM THE BENCHES
Both goalies gave a good exhibition with Morgan's full length save from Armstrong the best of the match. Morgan the better goalie however. The Battery backs were better as a pair though Nelson came through in good style often. Eby in a new position at centre half played a good game and gave Morgan one of the hardest shots. He is fast and a good tackler. Glen Smith tried hard but does not fit into a defence. Bob Armstrong added punch to the Legion forward line and, with Christison and Bill Murray, showed flashes of nice combination but they lacked the ability to capitalize on chances. In the halfback line for the Battery, Veitch played his usual hard game with good assistance from Darrow Gomez who replaced Hardy early in the game. A. Gomez and Ward were fair. Pavlikis is fast and a thorn in the flesh of the opposing defence but is slow on shooting. Holkestad and Parkhouse were dangerous at times as was Billy Gomez.

The quality of the game varied. Both teams showed signs of combination but a movement often fell down because the ball came to the player's "wrong foot." In senior football a player should be able to play a ball with either his right or his left foot. Both defences should have fallen offener, and both teams have a lot to thank their goalkeepers for.
