

## ENTHUSIASM FOR NAVY SEEN BY LOCAL OFFICER AT OTTAWA MEET

There is much enthusiasm generally in Canada for recruiting in the naval divisions, Lt. Walter Smith, executive officer of H.M.C.S. Chatham, reported last night following his return by plane yesterday from Ottawa where he attended a conference of commanding officers or their representatives of 20 of the 21 divisions across Canada.

Lt. Smith told of good progress which had been made by the conference in the way of planning and training programs considered in the light of the overall picture.

He enthused over the way the proceedings had been carried on

under the leadership of Capt. H. L. Quinn, D.S.C., director of Naval Reserves for Canada. Capt. Quinn is a former Prince Rupert boy and his first naval experience was in the old Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Naval Reserve here twenty-five years ago.

"Everything was strictly business," said Lt. Smith describing the sessions.

Added interest was lent to the proceedings through the presence for the first time of a representative of H.M.C.S. "Cabot," St. John's, Newfoundland, in the person of Lt. Cdr. Fabian O'Dea.

Lt. Smith gave a report to his fellow officers last night in the course of the weekly parade of the local division which was followed by the showing of training films and a sports night which featured basketball practice.

The local division now has a strength of about 45 officers and men.

### EXPERIENCES

While in Ottawa, Lt. Smith met E. T. Applewhite M. P. for Skeena with whom he had luncheon and who showed him around the Parliament Buildings. An experience in Toronto was watching one of the world's two commercial jet passenger planes taking off, flying and landing. It was an amazing spectacle at Malton Airport.

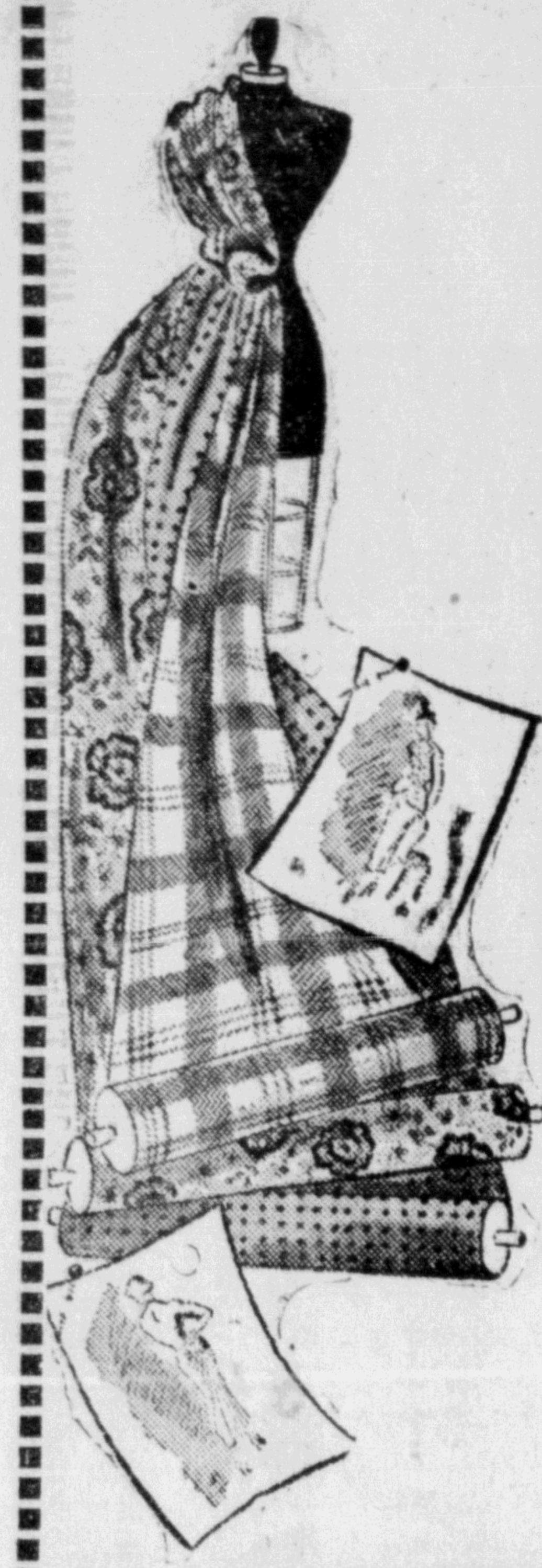

## Timely Recipe

### Celery Stuffing

12 cups dry bread cubes  
1 medium onion, chopped fine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 cup melted butter or margarine  
2 10-ounce tins cream of celery soup  
Mix bread cubes, onion and seasonings; pour on butter while stirring. Stir soup; then add, blending lightly. Stuff fowl. Makes moist stuffing for 12 pound fowl.
