dential wall party line phones is \$1.75 monthly, while 412 subscribers who have monophone wall party line phones pay \$2 monthly. The new plan would lump both together on a net \$2.50 charge.

Similarly, residential party lines with standard desk phones, which now pay \$2.25 and residential party lines with desk monophones, which pay \$2.50, would be grouped together with a \$2.75 charge.

Residential main line standard wall phones, and residential main line mono wall phones, which now pay \$2.75 and \$3.00 respectively, would both pay \$3.50, while residential main line standard desk and residential main line mono desk instruments, which now pay \$3.25 and \$3.50 respectively, will pay \$3.75.

Ratio of increase on business telephones is greater than on residential-phones. However, because of the vastly greater number of residential subscribers, bulk of the total increase will come from residential subscribers.

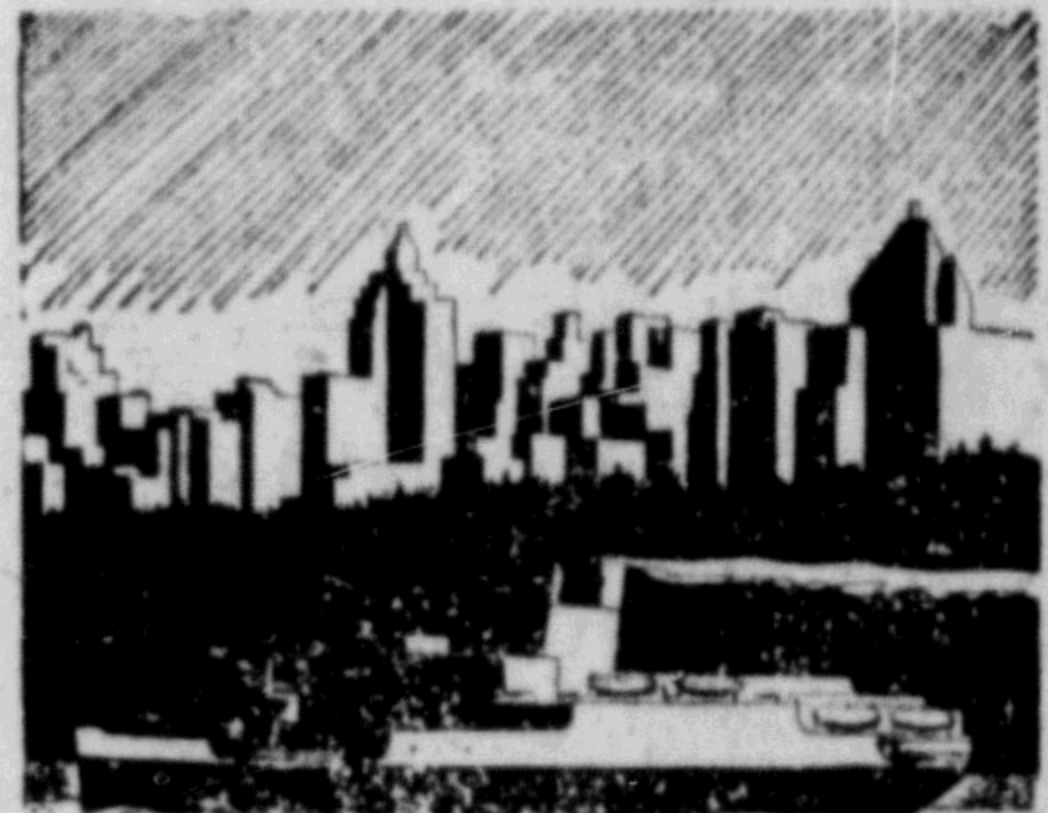
All increases in subscriber rates will be on a net basis, payable by the fifteenth of the month previous. A gross amount of \$1 more will be charged on accounts payable after the fifteenth.

On motion of Alderman H. S. Whalen, seconded by Alderman W. F. Stone, the plan was adopted. Favoring the motion were Alderman Whalen, Stone, Black, Forman, Casey and McLean.

Alderman Daggett opposed the motion. Alderman George Rudderham, acting as Mayor in the absence of Mayor Nora Arnold, did not vote.

A bylaw will be necessary before the new rates come into effect. It will receive its first reading at a special meeting later this month and its final reading in November.

The new plan will raise the monthly revenue derived from the city's 2,044 telephones from \$4,848 to \$6,655, providing a fund of \$1,806 monthly for rehabilitation which will probably start next spring.
