HOW CAN I ? ? ?

Q. How can I keep a blanket
fluffy after washing it?

A. Wash in warm suds, then
hang on the line and rinse with
the garden hose. After it has
dried, pin it to the line and beat
it with a carpet beater.

Charles Wilkinson— Is Back From British Trip

Charles Wilkinson, student of
Booth Memorial High School, is
back in Prince Rupert after a
tour of Britain with fifty other
Canadian boys as guests of Gar-
field Weston, British industrial-
ist. The tour was arranged by
Mr. Weston with the object of
cementing closer Commonwealth
relationships. The youths repre-
sented all parts of Canada, and
spent five weeks in England and
Scotland.

They were to have made the
voyage to Britain aboard the
Franconia, but when she ran
aground in the St. Lawrence
River, below Quebec City, they
transferred to a trans-Atlantic
plane. After a trip back to Que-
bec City in a smaller ship
crowded with other persons
from the Franconia.

The flight to London gave the
boys more days there and they
saw much more there than they
would have been able to other-
wise.

Wilkinson and three Vancou-
ver boys left London August 19,
arriving at Montreal eight days
later where they boarded the
Vancouver train. By the time it
arrived in Edmonton, the nation-
al railway strike had "frozen"
it there. The rest of the trip to
the coast was made by air.

The boys had a hard time in
Britain adjusting themselves to
four meals a day.

After breakfast, lunch and
dinner, they had to have tea,
which was really another din-
ner.

Then there was a snack before
we went to bed. It was quite a
job eating all the food.

Edinburgh.

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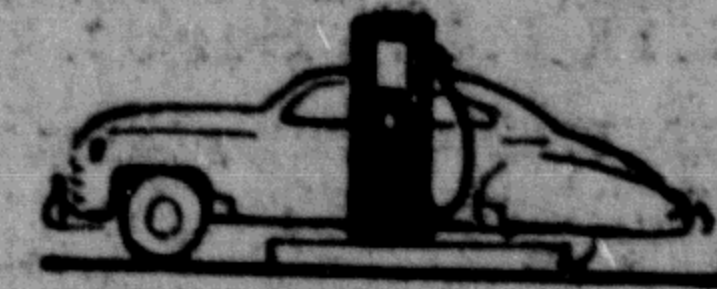

she tell her hostess of the fact?

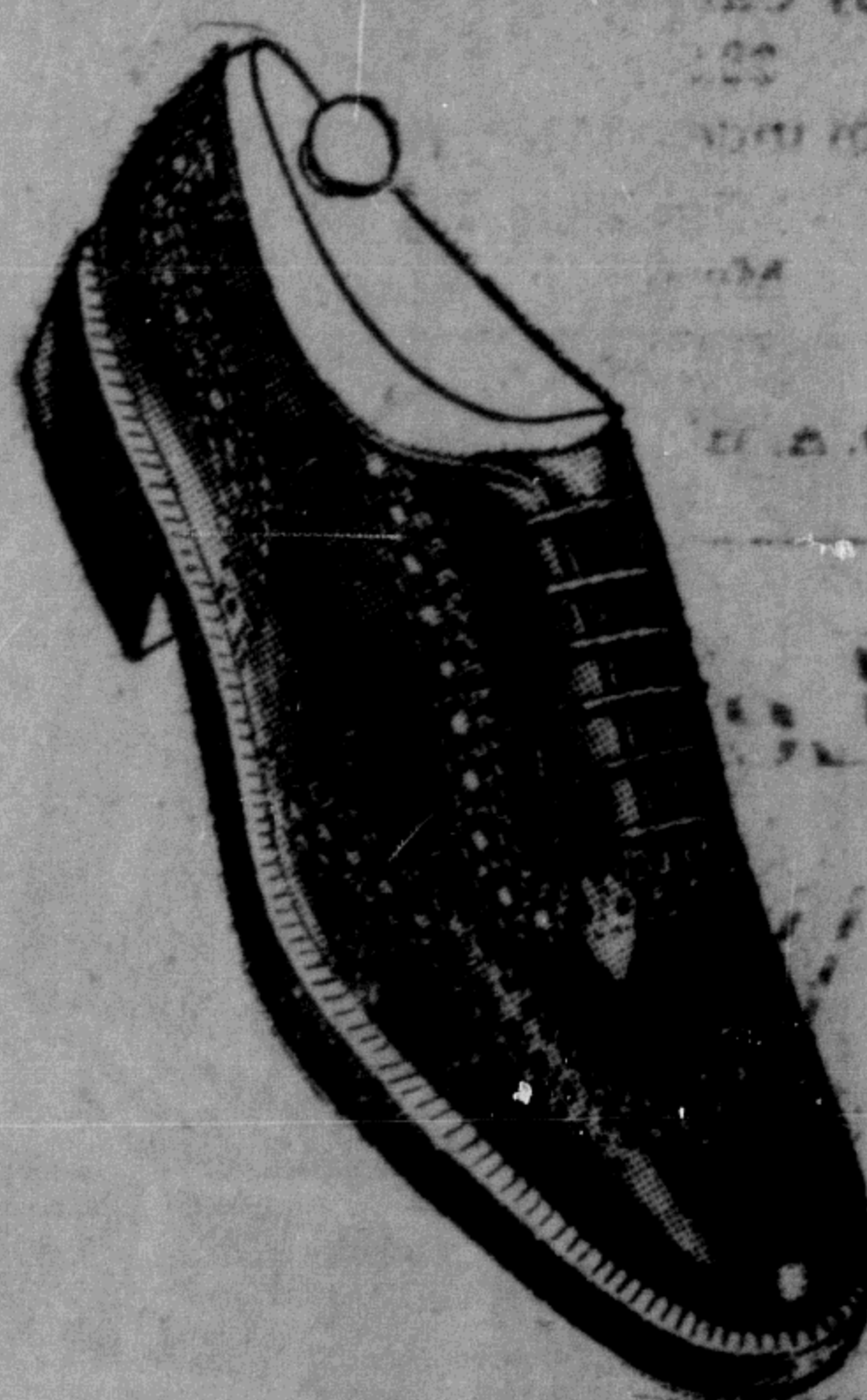
A. Yes; it is the only thing to

formal dress if her escort does.



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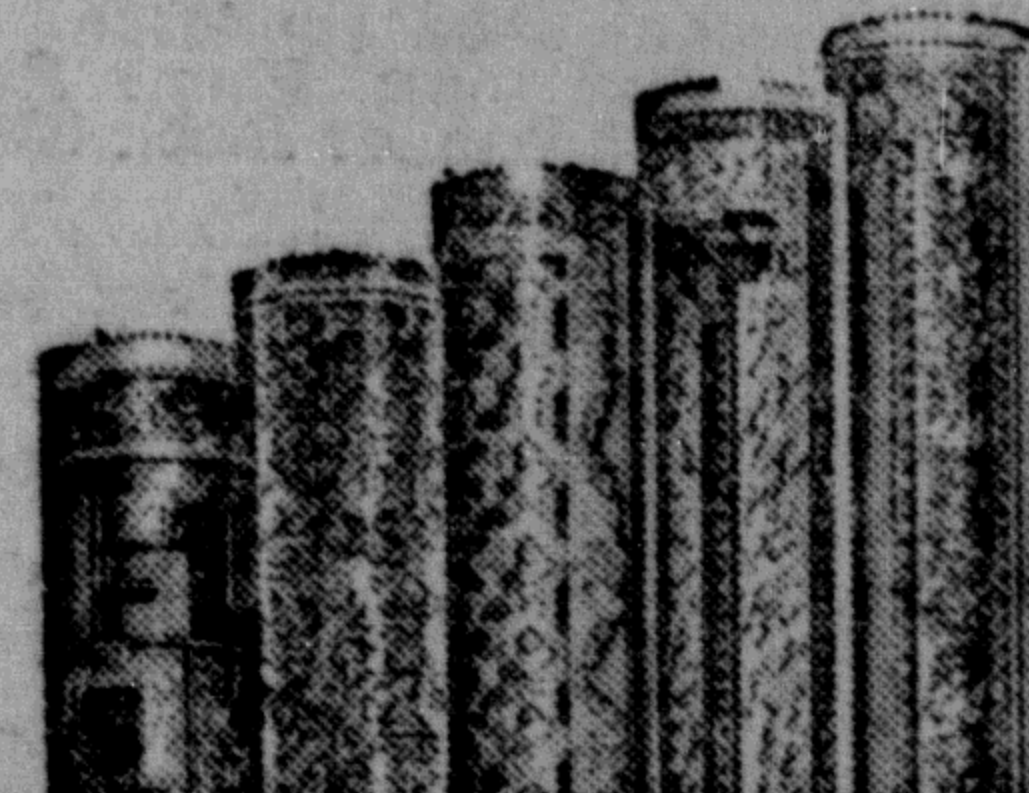
