Buildings To Have Proper Firewalls

Fire wall requirements in the
new liquor store and the electric
shop building will be complied
with, the city council was told
by City Engineer Don Stewart at
their regular meeting last night.

The matter was brought up by
Ald. J. N. Forman, who said he
had been approached by Fire
Chief E. W. Becker in the after-
noon concerning the matter. The
city's bylaws called for a fire wall
to reach three feet above the
roof of any building, he said, and
plans for neither building called
for that.

Engineer Stewart said he had
spoken with contractors for both
buildings during the afternoon
and that both had agreed to con-
tinue the wall up the necessary
distance although it would be
necessary to gain permission
from Victoria to alter the plans
of the liquor store. That per-
mission, he assured the council,
would be forthcoming.

Superintendents Storm Report

On request from Ald. T. B.
Black, last night's meeting of
the city council heard a report
from Utilities Superintendent J.
F. Edwards on the situation re-
garding lines out of order due to
the week-end storm.

On conclusion of the report, Ald.
Black thanked the superintend-
ent and said he asked for the
report because it had been pub-
lished in the paper and that he
thought the council should
have it first hand.

Ald. J. N. Forman said it was
a condition that would have to
be faced every time there was a
severe storm.

Ald. Black also called atten-
tion to some parking violations
he had witnessed and asked
that the police committee have
the department check the of-
fences more closely. Council
concurred unanimously.

Timely Recipe

Here's something brand new.
If you want to serve a before-
dinner appetizer that is different,
try this tea cocktail. It's really
good and has a tang that will
whet your appetite.

- 1 tea bag
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup grapefruit juice
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- cracked ice

Add boiling water to tea bag
and brew for five minutes. Re-
move the bag and allow the brew
to drop to room temperature.
Put into a cocktail shaker or jar
with tight-fitting cover. add fruit
juices and cracked ice. Cover
tightly and shake vigorously un-
til the ice is practically dissolved.
Serves 4-6.

The two lads were fishing in

An artery had been severed,
