PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

According to a story in the Vancouver World, a New York syndicate was planning one of the largest timber deals on the continent which would result in construction of a pulp mill at or near Prince Rupert.

A delegation consisting of W. E. Fisher, Miss R. M. Davies, Mrs. C. C. Mills and Mrs. E. C. McCoskrie appeared before the city council requesting that a grant be made by the city toward the operation of the Ridley Home.

There were 1,300 telephones in use in the city, according to the utilities committee report read by Alderman Macdonald. The committee planned to hold one "open day" a week so that subscribers might inspect the exchange.

April 10, 1913
James Hunter, rancher at Sandspit, died in the General Hospital here. He was a native of Scotland and was 64 years old.

The steamer Spokane was in port, crowded with gold seekers bound for Teslin Lake. Several prospectors took passage from here.

The interior district was in the grip of a severe blizzard. More than a foot of snow had fallen at several points along the railway in one day.

F. G. Dawson, who returned from Vancouver, announced that he had purchased the W. J. McMillan wholesale business and would take possession immediately.

SHORT SPORT

Two of Britain's leading boxing promoters are trying to rid ringsides of "certain elements" blamed for creating disturbances at big fights by their betting activities. Jack Solomons wrote 43 of his regular "patrons" telling them to keep away from his shows. If they persist in coming he threatens to get a court order to keep them out. Another promoter, Harry Greenberg, has done the same. He says: "Warning them from the ring has apparently not checked them. So I have now informed all of them they will not be allowed at any of my promotions and if they do appear, they will be removed from the halls." Solomons refused to comment on his action but said some of the letters went to men who booed the referees and shouted at boxers.

Writing in the News of the World, George Harrison, said these moves will be welcomed by every sport fan. "Despite everything promoters have done in the past to prevent it," he said, "betting has been going on in an ever-increasing degree at London boxing shows. Somewhat naturally, it is not unknown for the gamblers, with their money at stake, to yell and storm out instructions to the fighters during the progress of contests in obvious attempts to influence the referee."
