

NEURNBERG (CP)-Fourteen officers of Adolf Hitler's SS Elite Guard were sentenced today to hang for at least one million killings. The sentences wound up the biggest murder trial in history.

The men were leaders of "Einsatz Commandos, special extermination squads which were sent into

Russia to do away with people\* classified by the Nazis as racially undesirable.

Two other men drew life terms and another five were sent to prison for lesser terms ranging down to ten years.

Major-General Otto Onlendorf was one of those sentenced to death. He admitted in the trial .021/4 before an American court that his Einsatz group had killed .02½ 90,000 Jews. He was top man in a special brigade of 2000 triggermen organized by Hitler.

## REVOLUTION COLOMBIA

INTER - AMERICAN CONFERENCE IS DISTURBED BY BLOODY COUP

RED COUP DOWNED ASUNCION (CP)-Paraguayan police announced today that they had scotched an attempted Communist coup. They said it was coordinated with similar moves in other countries aimed at interference with the inter-American conference at Bo-

gota, Colombia.

BOGOTA, Colombia — The Conservative government of Colombia was overthrown by the leftist Liberals in a bloody revolutionary uprising yesterday even as the Pan-American conference, with representatives from 21 American republics including the United States, was in session.

The revolution followed a leftist Liberal leader being assassinated, his murderer being dragged forth and kicked to death. Setting up of the Liberal junta ensued.

Last night the capital city here was in wild disorder, almost uncontrolled.

Today the city was a paralyzed shambles with at least one hundred persons killed and 200 injured, according to one report.

Thirty-five of the capital's major buildings were on fire in the embattled downtown area.

Conflagrations still raged in the heart of the city today with the revolutionary rioters surging through the streets which were littered with debris and corpses. Looters worked in the fire-torn premises.

The Conservative government. which is headed by President Mariano Ospina said today it expected to regain control. Perez declared communist influences inspired the revolution.
