### CITY PEOPLE RETURN FROM NORWAY TRIP

The people of Norway are not particularly worried about the threat of an East-West war in the opinion of Harold Grindstrand, Prince Rupert fisherman who returned on the Prince Rupert Wednesday from a five-months visit to his homeland.

Mr. Grindstrand was one of 10 local people who left the city early last October. The party brought back an additional member, Miss Edith Soines, who will join her father, Einar Soines here.

General conditions in Norway were not "too good," Mr. Grindstrand said. Food was in good supply, but there was a consistent shortage of clothing. He spent the winter in and near Oslo.

The winter he described as "tough," without a great deal of snow, but low temperatures and strong winds. He is glad to be back home at 246 Fifth Avenue East.

The party left Prince Rupert on October 2 and sailed from New York on the liner Stavangerjord. They landed back in New York on the same vessel on February 18.

Snow conditions on the rail line east of Prince Rupert delayed their expected arrival here last Saturday night, causing them to continue on to Vancouver and take the Prince Rupert north on Monday.
