**MAKES APPEAL FOR MISSIONS**

Miss H. R. Hurd Principal Speaker at Meeting of United Church W. M. S. Presbyterial

An urgent appeal for support of church mission work was made by Miss Helen R. Hurd, local deaconess of the United Church of Canada, who was the principal speaker last night before a meeting which opened sessions of the Prince Rupert Presbyterial of the Women's Missionary Society in First United Church. Miss Hurd opened her talk with the reading of a letter from a Japanese-Canadian who had returned to Hiroshima and who had revealed his own deepening Christian experience and emphasized the need for Christian workers. The speaker ably developed her appeal by showing how a treasure had been received from the past when "God sent His son that we might have His Sonship." The Christian who was conscious of his oneness with Christ must, of necessity, share his faith with others.

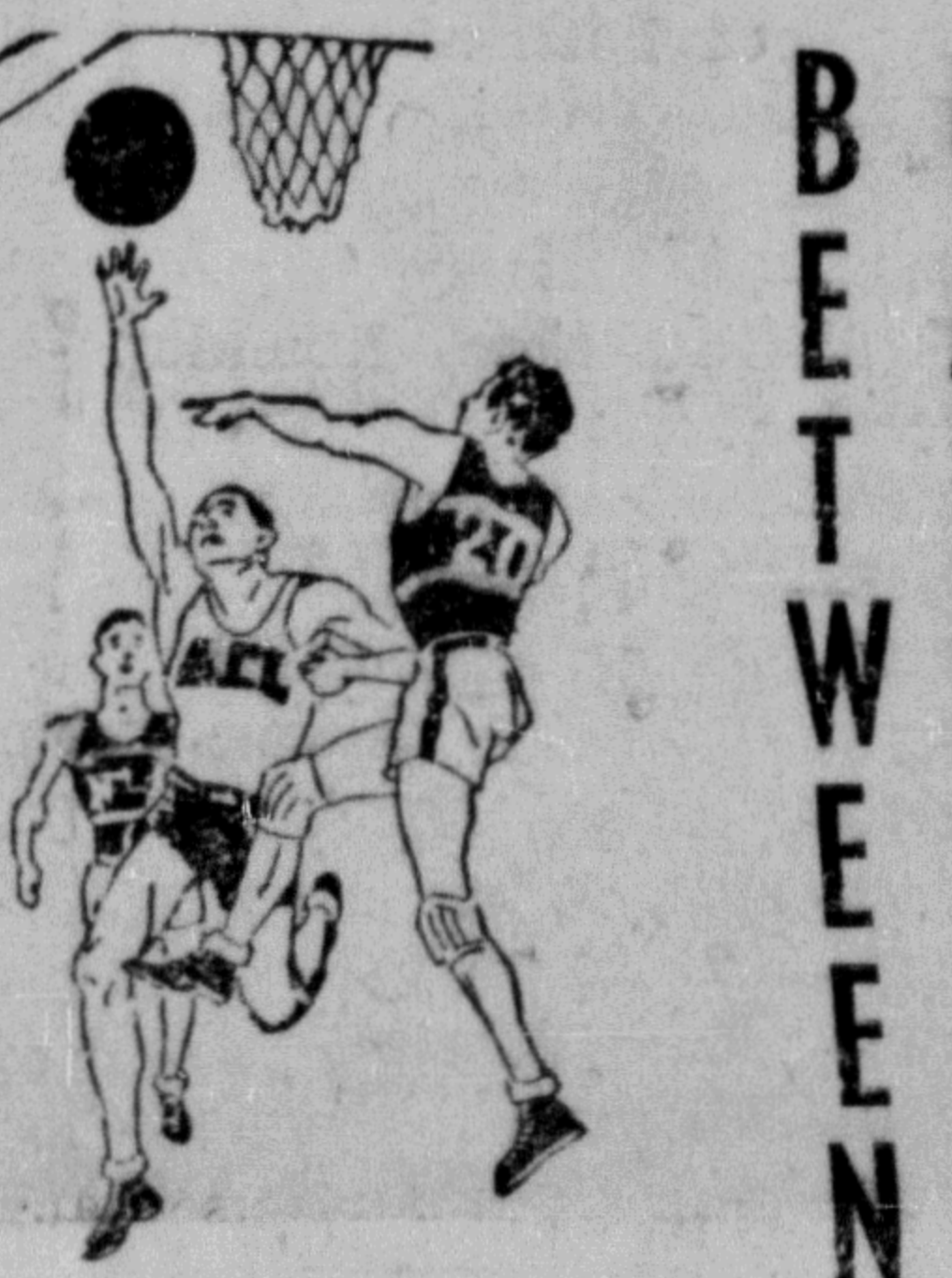

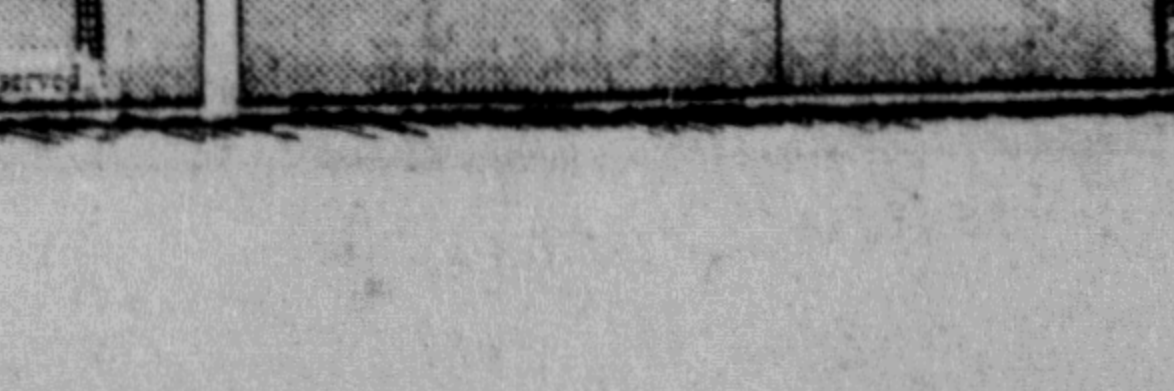

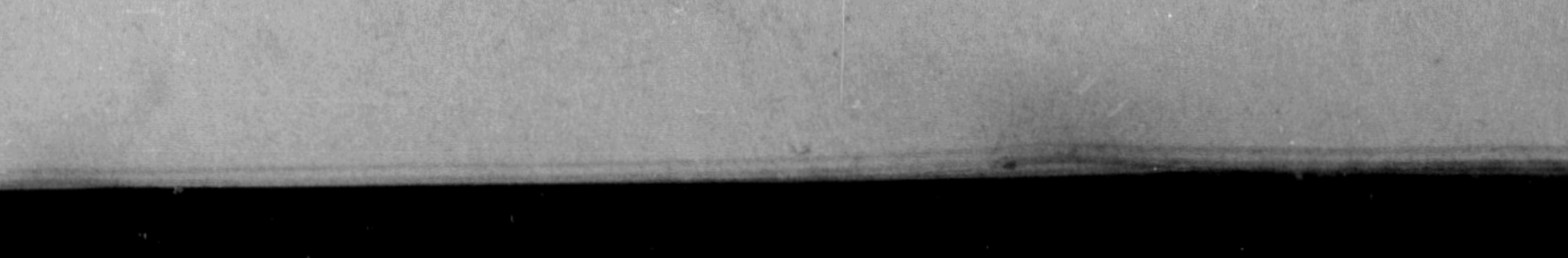
